Scary Look at World Traffic in Armame

THE WAR BUSINESS. The Inments. By George Thayer. Simon & Schuster, 417 pages, \$6.95

This is the kind of book that can throw a good scare into anyone who takes the time to think about it.

What is particularly scary is not so much the threat from . the international trade in arbe-but the way a book like this takes gossip, rumor and journalistic reports and gives them a kind of legitimacy they do not possess on their own merits simply by encasing them between the hard covers of a book.

Take one paragraph, almost
