# East Germany Links Boy Scouts to CIA

BERLIN (UPI)—What do the Boy Scouts of America, the Young Women's Christian Assn., Harvard University, the American Newspaper Guild and the Butte Pipeline Co. have in common?

They all are involved with the Central Intelligence Agency, according to a book entitled "Yellow List: Where Is the CIA?" published in East Germany.

The book, by Dr. Julius Mader, says it lists "418 camouflaged or subsidized organizations of the U.S. secret intelligence network on five continents."

### Not Surprised

American officials here were not surprised to find that such organizations as the American Red Cross, the American Newspaper Publishers Assn., the Boy Scouts and news media and universities were listed.

They said Mader provided some laughs two years

ago when he published his "Who's Who in the CIA." That book listed then President Lyndon B. Johnson, Dean Rusk, Arthur Schlesinger, Cyrus R. Vance and Hubert H. Humphrey as CIA agents.

Mader said "for the first time in the world" he was publishing a list of "camouflaged or subsidized organizations of the U.S. intelligence network."

### Controlled List

He said the list included institutions directly controlled by the CIA, organizations which have been or still are subsidized fully or in part by the CIA, and organizations which have been infiltrated by former leading officers, officials or employes of civilian and military secret service organizations.

The book mentioned the following news media: Atlanta Journal and Constitution, CBS Television Network, Columbia Broadcasting System, the Curtis Publishing Co., Encoun-

ter, Fortune, the Houston Post, Life, NBC Television, Newsweek, New York Daily News, New York Times.

Also Overseas News Agency, Phoenix Gazette, Radio Free Asia, Radio Free Europe, Radio Liberation, Raleigh News and Observer, Raleigh Times, St. Paul Dispatch and Pioneer Press, St. Petersburg Times, the Saturday Evening Post, the Scripps Howard Newspapers, Time and U.S. News and World Report.

The universities and colleges listed included Harvard, Yale, Columbia, Williams, Stanford, Cornell, and the universities of California, Chicago, Cincinnati, Houston, Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky, Maryland, Miami, Michigan, Oklahoma, Pennsylvania, Utah, Vermont, Washington, Wichita and Wisconsin.

Among others listed were the National Council of Churches, General Motors, General Electric, Radio Corp. of America, the Ford Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Moral Rearmament Movement and the United Lutheran Relief.
