
Dear Mr. Casey:

I want to strongly endorse the 15 June 1984 draft of the National Policy on the Transfer of Scientific and Technical Information.

When the issue of scientific communication and national security rose to prominence a few years ago I, along with the presidents of four other major research universities, strongly advocated the position being espoused in this draft statement.
