



- 2. THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION MAY BE RELEVANT TO DELIBERATIONS REFTEL.
- D. ON SEPTEMBER & CONSUL GENERAL ACCUMPANIED MORTIMER ZUCKEPMAN EDITOR IN CHIEF OF U.S. NEWS AND WORLD REPURT ON HIS MEETING WITH AICK DANILOFF THE SOVIET INVESTIGATOR WAS PRESENT THROUGHOUR THE MLETING TAKING COPIOUS NOTES. THE DISCUSSION BETWEEN ZUCKERMAN AND DANILOFF CONCERNED THE OBTAILS OF DANILOFF S ARREST IN GREAT DETAIL. IN THIS CONNECTION ZUCKERMAN QUESTIONED DANILOFF EXTENSIVELY ON THE HISTORY OF HIS RELATIONSHIP WITH "MISHA," THE FRIEND FROM FRUNZE WHO HANDED DANILOFF THE PACKAGE OF "CLIPPINGS." DANILOFF DID NOT ENOW MISHA'S LAST NAME, 1 CANILOFF SAID THAT HE HAD MET MISHA FOUR YEARS AGO AND HAD ASKED HIM TO PROVIDE NEWSPAPER CLIPPINGS FROM CENTRAL ASIA

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TO ASSIST IN HIS COVERAGE OF THE WAR IN AFGHANISTAN. SUBSEQUENTLY MISHA DID PROVIDE SUCH MATERIALS FROM TIME TO TIME, INCLUDING ON OCCASION SOME PICTURES OF SOVIET TROOPS IN AFGHANISTAN. DANILOFF INDICATED THAT HE HAD ALREADY PROVIDED THIS INFORMATION TO THE SOVIET INVESTIGATOR, UNDER QUESTIONING.

- 4. TOWARD THE END OF THE SESSION, ZUCKERMAN EXPLAINED TO THE INVESTIGATOR THAT THE AMERICAN PRESS HABITUALLY REACHES BEYOND "OFFICIAL" SOURCES FOR INFORMATION, AT TIMES MANAGING TO OBTAIN VERY SENSITIVE INFORMATION ABOUT U.S. GOVERNMENT POLICY. THE INVESTIGATOR RESPONDED THAT THE ISSUE HERE WAS HOW CORRESPONDENTS OBTAINED INFORMATION THEY WERE NOT AUTHORIZED TO POSSESS IN THE SOVIET UNION.
- 5. THE INVESTIGATOR APPEARS TO BE PURSUING A LINE OF INQUIRY THAT WILL PROVIDE THE BASIS FOR CHARGING DANILOFF WITH IMPROPER CONDUCT UNDER SOVIET PROCEDURES. THE DEFINITION OF ESPIONAGE IN ARTICLE 65 OF THE RSFSR CRIMINAL CODE INCLUDES THE TEANSMISSION OR COLLECTION AT THE REQUEST OF FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE OF OTHER MATERIALS TO BE USED TO DAMAGE THE INTERESTS OF THE USSR IF THE ESPIONAGE IS CARRIED OUT BY ECPEION CITIZENS OR STATELESS PERSONS. TO THE USSR OF THE MATERIALS TO BE MATERIALS TO BE USED TO DESIGN TO INCLUDE NON-SECRET MATERIAL. TO UNDER THIS DEFINITION THE FACT THAT THISHAT PROVIDED DANILOFF SENSITIVE MATERIALS -- CLASSIFIED OR UNCLASSIFIED -- EVIDENTLY COULD BE USED TO BOLSTER A CASE OF ESPIONAGE.

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5. WITH REGARD TO REPORTS FROM MRS. DANILOFF THAT

HER HUSBAND WILL BE HELD TEN DAYS. AND THEN CHARGED OR RELEASED. THIS IS NORMAL PRACTICE IN ACCORDANCE

THIS STAGE -- DURING WHICH PERSONS UNDER SUSPICION ARE DETAINED AND INTERROGATED, WITNESSES ARE QUESTIONED, AND EVIDENCE IS COLLECTED -- IS RESTRICTED TO TEN DAYS. IN "EXCEPTIONAL CASES" THE LENGTH OF THIS STAGE MAY BE EXTENDED BY THE PROCURATOR. AFTER THIS STAGE. THE CASE IS TRANSFERRED TO ANOTHER AUTHORITY FOR "PRELIMINARY INVESTIGATION," WHICH CAN LAST UP TO FOUR MONTHS, AND EVEN LONGER IN "COMPLICATED" CASES. WE BELIEVE THAT IN QUOTING THE TEN DAY PERIOD TO DANILOFF (AS U.S. PRESS HAS REPORTED), THE INVESTIGATOR WAS SIMPLY RESPONDING TO MRS. DANILOFF'S QUESTIONS ABOUT HER HUSBAND'S STATUS BY EXTRAPOLATING FROM NORMAL SOVIET LEGAL PROCEDURE. COMBS





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
