Dear Mr. Greenburg:

Following up on our recent conversation, I've enclosed some material on the "drug czar" issue.

Current law (21 U.S.C. §1203 (d) - copy enclosed) provides that the Drug Policy Board shall take no action inconsistent with the powers and duties of the Director of Central Intelligence under statute or Executive Order. Throughout the "czar v. board" debate, this caveat has been retained: S. 789, an early Biden bill, and H.R. 4916, the House Judiciary Committee's contribution to the House Democratic leadership's omnibus bill, both have it (copies enclosed).

The provision, however, appears to be missing from the latest drafts of the "Byrd" and "Dole" Senate omnibus bills. We hope that in its discussions with the Senate on the "drug czar" portion of the bill, the Administration will support retention of this important provision.

(3) coordinate the collection and evaluation of information necessary to implement United States policy with respect to illegal drug law enforcement and to the reduction of drug abuse; and

(4) provide policy guidance to the agencies and facilitate resolution of differences in this area conerning interagency activities and other matters affecting two or more agencies.

(c) In order to help coordinate the activities of Executive departments and agencies with responsibility for drug law enforcement and drug abuse reduction, and to supervise implementation of the determinations of the Board, the Chairman shall:

(1) advise the Board in matters concerning its responsibilities;

(2) make recommendations to the Board for the coordination of drug enforcement and drug abuse reduction activities;

(3) correlate and evaluate intelligence and other information to support the activities of the Board;

(4) act as primary advisor to the President and the Congress on national and international programs and policies and the implementation of those policies; and

(5) perform such other duties as the President may direct.

(d) The Board shall carry out all duties and responsibilities of the National Drug Enforcement Policy Board, as set forth in Chapter XIII (The National Narcotics Act) of Title II of Public Law 98-473 [this chapter].

(e) Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to affect the authorities or responsibilities of the Office of Management and Budget, or any Office or official thereof.

Sec. 3. Coordinating Groups. The Board shall establish a Drug Enforcement Coordinating Group and a Drug Abuse Prevention and Health Coordinating Group. The membership and chairman of each Coordinating Group shall be designated by the Chairman of the Board.

Sec. 4. Conforming Amendments. (a) Section 1 of Executive Order No. 12368 [set out as a note under section 1112 of this title] is amended to provide as follows:

"The Office of Policy Development has been assigned to assist the President and the National Drug Policy Board in the performance of the drug policy functions contained in Section 201 of Title II of the Drug Abuse Prevention, Treatment, and Rehabilitation Act, as amended (21 U.S.C. 1111). Within the Office of Policy Development, the Director of the Drug Abuse Policy Office shall be primarily responsible for assisting the President and the Board in the performance of those func-

## § 1203. Responsibilities and functions of National Drug Enforcement Policy Board

## (a) Coordination of operations and policy

The Board shall facilitate coordination of United States operations and policy on illegal drug law enforcement. In the furtherance of that responsibility, the Board shall have the responsibility, and is authorized to-

(1) review, evaluate and develop United States Government policy, strategy an resources with respect to illegal drug law enforcement efforts, including budgetary priorities and a National and International Drug Law Enforcement

(2) facilitate coordination of all United States Government efforts to halt national and international trafficking in illegal drugs; and

(3) coordinate the collection and evaluation of information necessary to implement United States policy with respect to illegal drug law enforcement.

### (b) Duties of Chairman

For the purpose of coordinating the activities of the several departments and agencies with responsibility for drug law enforcement and implementing the determinations of the Board, it shall be the duty of the Chairman-

(1) to advise the Board in matters concerning drug law enforcement;

(2) to make recommendations to the Board for the coordination of drug

enforcement activities; (3) to correlate and evaluate intelligence and other information on drug law enforcement to support the activities of the Board;

(4) to act as primary advisor to the President and Congress on national and international illegal drug law enforcement programs and policies developed by the Board under subsection (a) of this section and the implementation thereof;

(5) to perform such other duties as the President may direct.

## (c) Authority of Chairman

In carrying out responsibilities under this section, the Chairman, on behalf of the

Board, is authorized to-(1) direct, with the concurrence of the head of the agency employing such personnel, the assignment of Government personnel within the United States Government in order to implement United States policy with respect to illegal drug law enforcement;

(2) provide guidance in the implementation and maintenance of policy, strategy, and resources developed under subsection (a) of this section;

(3) review and approve the reprogramming of funds relating to budgetary

priorities developed under subsection (a) of this section; (4) procure temporary and intermittent services under section 3109(b) of Title 5, but at rates for individuals not to exceed the daily equivalent of the maximum annual rate of basic pay payable for the grade of GS-18 of the General Schedule:

(5) accept and use donations of property from all Government agencies; and

(6) use the mails in the same manner as any other department or agency of the executive branch.

## (d) Non-interference with operations of other agencies

Notwithstanding the authority granted in this section, the Board and the Chairman shall not interfere with routine law enforcement or intelligence decisions of any agency and shall undertake no activity inconsistent with the authorities and responsibilities of the Director of Central Intelligence under the provisions of the National Security Act of 1947, as amended, or Executive Order 12333.

# A BILL

To provide the framework necessary to pursue a coordinated and effective national and international narcotics control policy.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "National Narcotics Lead-
- 5 ership Act of 1987".

1	SEC. 2. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE.
2	(a) FINDINGS.—The Congress hereby makes the follow-
3	ing findings:
4	(1) The flow of narcotics into the United States is
5	a major and growing problem.
6	(2) The problem of illegal drug activity and drug
7	abuse falls across the entire spectrum of Federal activi-
8	ties, both nationally and internationally.
9	(3) Illegal drug trafficking is estimated to be a
0	\$100,000,000,000 a year industry in the United
1	States.
12	(4) The annual consumption of heroin in the
13	United States remains in the range of four metric tons,
14	sustaining one-half a million addicts, while cocaine con-
15	sumption has increased sharply, with approximately
16	five million to six million Americans using cocaine
17	regularly.
18	(5) Drug abuse poses a threat to our most pre-
19	cious resource, our young people; with almost two-
<b>2</b> 0	thirds of the graduating high school class of 1985
21	having used an illicit drug and 17 percent having used
22	cocaine, the highest rate ever recorded since the
28	survey has been taken.
24	(6) Such significant indicators of the drug problem
25	as drug-related deaths, emergency room visits, hospital

1	admissions due to drug-related incidents, and addiction
2	rates are soaring.
3	(7) Increased drug trafficking is strongly linked to
4	violent, addiction-related crime and studies have shown
5	that over 90 per centum of heroin users rely upon
6	criminal activity as a means of income.
7	(8) Much of the drug trafficking is handled by syn-
8	dicates which results in increased violence and criminal
9	activity because of the competitive struggle for control
10	of the domestic drug market.
11	(9) Any effective solution to the Nation's drug
12	problem must involve a comprehensive approach from
13	all levels of government, combining rigorous law en-
14	forcement and supply reduction initiatives with efforts
15	to reduce the demand for drugs through education, re-
16	search, and treatment.
17	(10) The magnitude and scope of the problem re-
18	quires a Director of National Drug Control Policy with
19	the responsibility for the coordination and direction of
<b>2</b> 0	all Federal efforts by the numerous agencies.
21	(11) Such a director must have broad authority
22	and responsibility for making management, policy, and
23	budgetary decisions with respect to all Federal agen-
24	cies involved in attacking this problem so that a unified

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and efficient effort can be made to eliminate the illegal
drug problem.
(b) PURPOSE.—It is the purpose of this Act to ensure—
(1) the development of a national policy with re-
spect to drug abuse and control;
(2) proper direction and coordination of all Feder-
al agencies involved in the effort to implement such a
policy; and
(3) that a single, competent, and responsible high-
level official of the United States Government, who is
appointed by the President, by and with the advice and
consent of the Senate, and who is accountable to the
Congress and the American people, will be charged
with the responsibility of coordinating the overall direc-
tion of United States policy, resources, and operations
with respect to drug control and abuse.
SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT OF OFFICE.
(a) Establishment of Office.—There is established
in the executive branch of the Government an office to be
known as the "Office of the Director of National Drug Con-
trol Policy" (hereafter in this Act referred to as the "Office of
the Director").
(b) DIRECTOR AND DEPUTY DIRECTORS.—(1) There
shall be at the head of the Office of the Director, a Director
