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


Chairman of the Board of the Presidential Classroom, Lutrelle F. Parker, has invited you to address the twentieth anniversary program of A Presidential Classroom For Young Americans on a convenient Monday sometime between January 23rd and March 12th between 10:00 - 11:00 a.m. at the Department of Agriculture. The suggested format is 20 minutes of remarks and 30 minutes of questions and answers. You could expect an audience of approximately 400 junior and senior high school students from across the United States visiting Washington to study American government, the electoral system, and global events. You would be asked to give your views on "Presidential Power: Inside the Oval Office." Members of the Board of Directors are Senator William Cohen, Senator Robert Dole, NBC newsman James Polk, and Chief Justice William Rehnquist to name a few. Committed speakers for 1988 season are John Harrington and Elliot Richardson. Former Director William Colby spoke to the group last year.

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As Director of Central Intelligence, I do not think that this warrants your time. Our Academic Coordinator also received an invitation to speak and will do so this spring. Dear Mr. Webster:

I am honored to extend to you an invitation on behalf of our Board of Directors, to address over 400 outstanding high school students during Presidential Classroom's twentieth anniversary program.

A Presidential Classroom for Young Americans attracts student leaders from across the United States and abroad to Washington, D.C. to study American government, the electoral system, and global events. We would welcome your insights during our seminar: "Presidential Power: the Oval Office" held during one of our seven weekly programs in 1988.

Recognizing your experience and expertise as Director of the CIA and former Director of the FBI, we are convinced that you would add dramatically to the students' understanding of Presidential decision-making, executive branch authority and limitations, and effective Presidential leadership.
