Weekly Report Highlights

Congress

- Staffers from both the Senate and House Intelligence Committees reacted favorably to the DDCI's request that the Committees consider restoring the Agency's authority to compensate military retirees who serve on DCI advisory committees. At the recommendation of Senate Committee staffers, the Office of Congressional Affairs is now coordinating this proposal within the Executive Branch. House Committee staffers said the proposal was too late to include in the House Authorization bill, but indicated that there would be no objection to considering the proposal in Conference if it is included in the Senate version of the bill.
  
- The new ADDO for Counterintelligence and the Director of Security and his management team provided Representative Richard Cheney with detailed briefings on current and future plans for the Agency's newly organized counterintelligence and security countermeasures program.

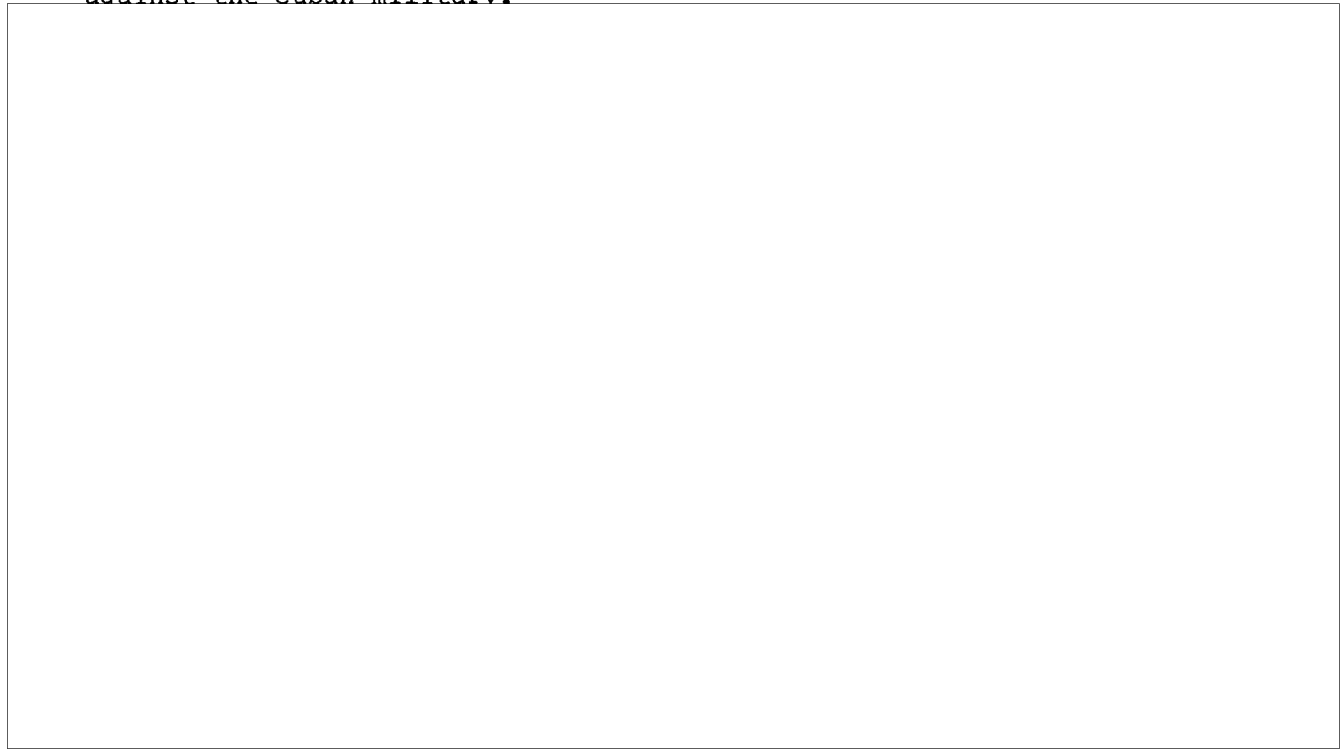

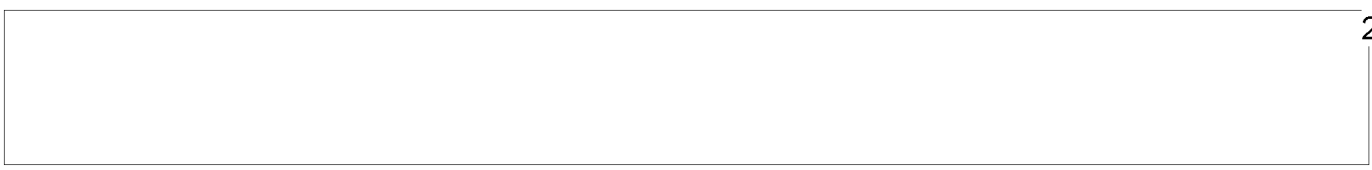

Military Retirees Advisory Committee Service Compensation.  
This week, at the DDCI's direction, we asked the staffs of our oversight committees to consider a late item for possible inclusion in the Fiscal Year 1989 Intelligence Authorization bill. The provision would restore the Agency's authority to provide monetary compensation to military retirees who serve on DCI advisory committees. The Senate staff gave positive indications the item could be included in its bill, not scheduled for markup until later in the month, provided that the item is appropriately coordinated within the Executive branch. We are taking steps now to accomplish this coordination. While the House Intelligence Committee staff stated that it was too late to include the item in its bill (which was being marked up yesterday), it did indicate that it would not object to it in Conference if the provision appears in the Senate bill.

A Pakistani official said tonight: "The trends seem to be very positive. We expect a positive outcome quite soon."

Diplomats here said they expected an agreement to be initialed in Geneva within days. They predicted the Russians would begin bringing troops home before President Reagan arrived in Moscow on May 29 for a summit meeting with Mr. Gorbachev.

## U.S. and Pakistan Optimistic

WASHINGTON, April 6 — Reagan administration officials and Pakistani diplomats today expressed optimism that an agreement would be reached leading to the withdrawal of Soviet troops from Afghanistan.

An Administration specialist said Soviet officials had indicated that they were prepared to accept an American formula allowing the United States and other nations to continue supplying the Afghan guerrillas if Moscow did not cut off supplies to the Kabul regime.

"We have been led to believe that they will accept it," the official said. He added that the Administration was still awaiting a final, formal response from the Russians.

"We're in the end game," Pakistan's ambassador, Jamsheed K. A. Marker, said after meeting at the State Department with Michael H. Armacost, Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs. The White House spokesman, Marlin Fitzwater, declined to speculate about the prospects for an agreement. But he told reporters in Santa Barbara, Calif., where the President is on vacation, that the Administration was convinced Moscow was preparing for a withdrawal.

"Every indication we have is that the Soviets are planning on pulling their troops out of Afghanistan," he said.

## Senator Urges Afghan Pact

### Exit Card for Afghan Officials

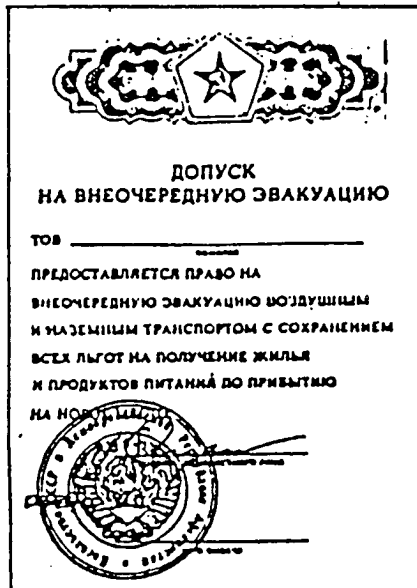
A card that appears to provide for the evacuation of Afghan officials in the event of a Soviet military withdrawal has been obtained by Freedom House, a New York-based organization monitoring political and human rights.

The card, 3 by 5 inches, bears the title "Permit for Special Evacuation" and is imprinted with a red star and a hammer and sickle. It is printed in Russian on one side, and Persian on the other.

The card is "ostensibly to be used by high-ranking Communist and Afghan officials on the occasion Soviet troops be withdrawn from Afghanistan," said Ludmilla Thorne, a Soviet specialist.

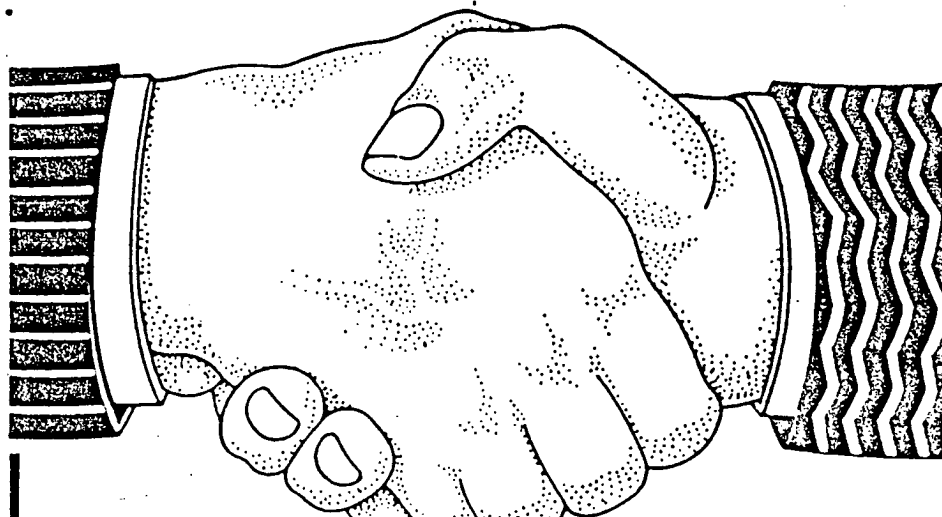
Ms. Thorne said she received a copy of the card from an American friend who said he had received it from Afghan insurgent forces on a visit to Peshawar, Pakistan, where the insurgents have their headquarters.

The card begins with the word, "Comrade," followed by a blank space, where the name of the holder can be inserted, and continues, "is granted the right of special evacuation by air and land transport, with the retention of



all privileges for receiving a place to live and food upon arrival."

That is followed by spaces for the signature of "a person of authority" and a "date of issue." The official stamp of the Embassy of the "U.S.S.R. in the Democratic Republic of Afghanistan" appears on the bottom left portion.
