

JUDGE:

You will be meeting with 14 White House Fellows at a luncheon on 12 June, and your 20-25 minutes of remarks will be followed by a 30-minute question and answer session.

In the talking points we have prepared, you note that the White House Fellows visited the Agency earlier this year (22 February). They were given an overview of the Agency and briefings from DI analysts for their 14-29 April trip to the Far East. This trip included visits to Japan, China (Shanghai), Hong Kong, and Thailand. You mention their trip to China and add: "After having visited China just several weeks before the student demonstrations began in full force, I'm sure all of you were particularly affected by the tragedy that occurred in Tiananmen Square last week."

After briefly discussing the situation in China, you say: "I'd like to consider what we think some of the administration's other top intelligence needs will be. And then I'd like to open it up for discussion." You discuss the intelligence challenges posed by events in Panama, Iran, and the Soviet Union. You also discuss several issues that transcend national boundaries -- arms control; ballistic missiles and chemical and biological weapons; terrorism; and narcotics.

In the conclusion, you mention the importance of observing the rules of oversight and accountability "that build trust between those who have the intelligence responsibility and those who are the elected representatives of the American people." Before opening up the meeting for discussion, you add: "...I believe we are providing the intelligence that policymakers need to make wise decisions on behalf of this country."

The cards we have given you are a shortened version of the reading text (see opposite). I believe they will be most useful to you if you are able to read the text first.

## INTRODUCTION

- IT'S ALWAYS A PLEASURE TO TALK TO WHITE HOUSE FELLOWS.
- DURING MY TIME AT THE FBI, I WAS FORTUNATE TO HAVE SEVERAL OUTSTANDING WHITE HOUSE FELLOWS ON MY STAFF. THEY PROVIDED THE BUREAU -- AND ME -- WITH VALUABLE SUPPORT IN AREAS SUCH AS THE DEVELOPMENT OF THE HOSTAGE CRISIS CENTER, AGENT TESTING AND EDUCATION, AND MINORITY RECRUITMENT.<sup>1</sup>
- I UNDERSTAND THAT LAST FEBRUARY, ALL OF YOU VISITED LANGLEY FOR AN OVERVIEW OF THE AGENCY AND FOR BRIEFINGS RELATED TO YOUR APRIL TRIP TO THE FAR EAST.
  - AFTER HAVING VISITED CHINA JUST SEVERAL WEEKS BEFORE THE STUDENT DEMONSTRATIONS BEGAN IN FULL FORCE, I'M SURE ALL OF YOU WERE PARTICULARLY AFFECTED BY THE TRAGEDY THAT OCCURRED LAST WEEK IN TIANANMEN SQUARE.
  - THE STUDENT MOVEMENT HAS NOT ONLY BUILT MOMENTUM FOR DEMOCRATIC REFORM, IT HAS TRIGGERED INTERNAL DIFFERENCES AT THE HIGHEST LEVELS OF THE CHINESE COMMUNIST PARTY.

- ACCURATE, TIMELY INFORMATION ABOUT WHAT'S GOING ON IN CHINA WILL BE ONE THE BUSH ADMINISTRATION'S MOST PRESSING INTELLIGENCE NEEDS.
- I'D LIKE TO TAKE A FEW MOMENTS TO CONSIDER WHAT WE THINK SOME OF THE ADMINISTRATION'S OTHER TOP INTELLIGENCE NEEDS WILL BE. AND THEN I'D LIKE TO OPEN IT UP FOR DISCUSSION.

STRUGGLES FOR LEADERSHIP IN PANAMA, IRAN

- THE RECENT VIOLENCE AND BLATANT VIOLATION OF THE DEMOCRATIC ELECTORAL PROCESS IN PANAMA IS A MATTER OF GREAT CONCERN TO US, AND WE ARE FOLLOWING DEVELOPMENTS IN THAT COUNTRY VERY CLOSELY.
- WE ARE ALSO CLOSELY FOLLOWING THE IMPACT OF KHOMEINI'S DEATH, LOOKING AT BOTH THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN IRAN AND AT THE IMPACT HIS DEATH WILL HAVE ON OUR RELATIONS.



REFORMS IN SOVIET UNION

- GORBACHEV'S "NEW THINKING" IS MAKING A MAJOR IMPRINT ON SOVIET ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL SYSTEMS, AS WELL AS FOREIGN POLICY.
- WE ARE NOW DEALING WITH THE INFORMATION EXPLOSION THAT GLASNOST HAS PRODUCED -- SORTING OUT WHAT IS IMPORTANT FROM WHAT IS NOT, WHAT IS REAL VERSUS WHAT MOSCOW WANTS US TO HEAR.

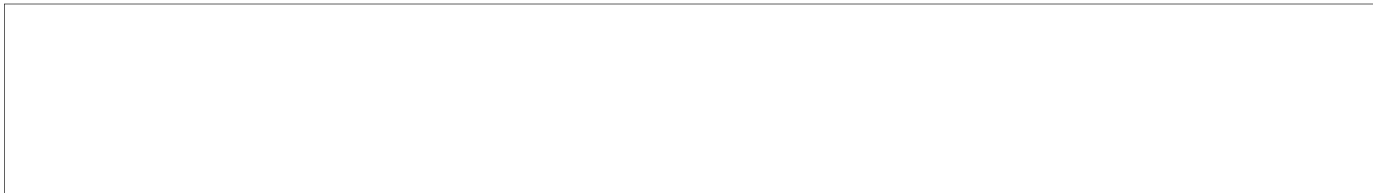

- WE ARE ALARMED AT THE EXTENT OF NARCOTICS ABUSE IN OUR OWN COUNTRY. AND ON THE INTERNATIONAL SCENE, WE SEE EVER INCREASING RATES IN DRUG PRODUCTION AND TRAFFICKING, AS WELL AS MORE VIOLENCE AND INTIMIDATION.
- I RECENTLY CREATED A COUNTERNARCOTICS CENTER AT THE AGENCY WHICH WILL INTEGRATE OUR COLLECTION AND ANALYSIS EFFORTS.

CONCLUSION

- I'VE TOUCHED ON ONLY SOME OF THE ISSUES THE INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY WILL BE ADDRESSING.
