## Summary


- Although the role of the Panama Canal in world trade is not minor and declining, the volume of traffic is expected to increase over the next 20 years. For these reasons, the Canal's closure would have a significant impact on the global economy.


## Major Shipping Tonnage Through the Panama Canal, 1987

## Canal Traffic in a Percent of Total World Trade



## Canal Traffic in a Percent of Total World Trade





## Canal Traffic in a Percent of Total World Trade




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
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
