WILLIAM HARDING JACKSON

Wartime deputy intelligence officer to General Omar N. Bradley, Mr. Jackson was born in 1901 in Nashville, Tenn. He is a graduate of Princeton, 1926, and of the Harvard Law School, 1926. After two years with the New York law firm of Cadwalader, Wickersham and Taft, Mr. Jackson joined the staff of Carter. Ledward and Milburn in 1930 to become a partner of that firm in 1926. Commissional a captain in the U. S. Army Air Force in 1942, Mr. Jackson went to London in January 1943 as assistant military air attache for anti-submarine intelligence in August 1943 he became chief of strategic intelligence for General Jacob L. Devers and with the formation of General Bradley's 12th Army Group, joined that went as deputy G-2. In August 1945 he was separated from the army in the rank of Calcadl. On his return to New York, Nr. Jackson joined the investment firm in H. Whitney & Company as managing partner. In 1948 he was named by the lattern to Dulles and Mathias F. Correa. On October 1, 1950 Mr. Jackson was appointed deputy director of Contral Intelligence.
