## Umpteen Clarifications of the Issue—and the National Press Is Still Confused!

BY NOW, ALMOST EVERYONE KNOWS or should know, that the Defense Intelligence Agency and the Central Intelligence Agency have different opinions (despite assertions of concurrence) about the degree to which Soviet military spending has increased since 1976.

Conflicting statements from Secretary of Defense Weinberger, Deputy ClA Director Robert Gates, and various ClA and DlA officials in February spawned a battery of conferences and briefings as all parties tried to convince the press and the public that there is agreement, at least in principle, on the rate of increase of the Russian defense buildup. The absence of a clarification from KGB Public Affairs left the issue contentious.
