Prof. Dr. A Diolm Classon Acas 49 ADDRESS: Koniginstrasso 73a, Banich, Gensany

PROJECT: QESMITCH (Gesellschaft für Wehrkunde; evert ex-officers' group.)

PROTTION IN PROJECT: Chief Agent; Installed by us as business manager of the Resellochaft, he has directed its growth and shaped its policies, publications and activities according to CRC instructions.

RELATIONSHIP WITH AGENCY: The Gesellschaft fur Wehrkunde, a purely OPC creation, was founded a year ago when in charge of the Soldaten Zeitung project, developed with his contacts the idea of organizing an overt, non-political study group, primarily composed of former senior Garman officers interested in the broader aspects of Garman defense. In full awareness of the nationalist-tinged Gendancies of its potential membership, it was decided to restrict membership to those exofficers and others who were willing to openly promise to oppose political extremiem of both Right and Loft, to work constructively for the democratic association of West Germany with the Western Allies and who were willing to . necept no respected conrades those former officers who participated in the 19th plot to overthrow the Hitler regime. The Genellschaft was founded on the basic of these points and acceptance of them has remained a regimement for membership. Turnigh the creation of local brunches and sections, through discussion meetings and publications, the Cosellachaft was to etimilate West German feeling in favor of the Contractual Agreements and the Duropean Defonsa Treatter.

Dr. Classen was recommended for the position of Recellochift business manager by Holmit Damerau, publisher of the Soldaton Meiting. Deserra did not personally know Classon; the latter had been recommended to him by ex-General Felix Stoiner. Classen was induced to resign from his position as business manager of a large German soft drink concern in Diesselderf and was brought to Munich. He has since been in regular contact with a UNFONCE case officer and has shaped his management of the Gesellschaft (it now has ever 190 local sections throughout Wost Hormany and more than 2,000 members) according to our mishes and interests. Where his personal views or pricies have conflicted with our own, he has accepted the course laid down by us.

ASSOCIATION TITH OUR PROJECTS: He has no working connection with other projects. However, he is aware of our support of the Solditen Zeitung and from the beginning has had considerable contact with Pasersau, It is clear that the two have discussed mitual problems relating to U.S. support - Chassen, for example, homes from Damerau that we are terminating support of the Soldaton Moiting by the end of January 1953.

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BACKGROUND: Dr. Clacton is a full professor and doctor of chilosophy. He studiod at the Universities of Koln, Jona and Hunich in the fields of philosophy and geography. His first teaching assignment of record was in 1931 at the German Oberreal schule in Athons, Greece. From 1932-35 he was in the far East as a faculty member at the state college and college for economic affairs, Yamaguchi, Japan. He returned to Germany in 1935 to teach philosophy at the University of Heidelberg. Early in the war he was assigned to the propaganda section of the OKY (German High Command) as an abalyst of enemy propaganda and East-Asian questions. He returned briefly to the Far East in 1941 as member of a German academic delegation cent to visit Japanese colleges. After nearly three more years of ONE duty, he was transferred to the Absshr (AUT VI/MI1) as Far Mastern expert in 1944. His final wartime assignment was as head of the East Asia section of the propaganda department in the short-lived government of Admiral Docnitz. He remained in intermment until 1947, spent a year as interpretor with Willitary Covernment, then entered Corman commercial life.

MOTIVATION: The writer, who has been in personal contact with Dr. Classen for less than two months, finds it difficult on such short notice to accurately assess his motivation, nor are the files particularly revealing on this subject. The writer is convinced, however, that a variety of motivating factors undoubtedly are present: (a) Dr. Classen's genuine intellectual conviction that Germany's future lies in concert with America and Wastern Europe, (b) his apparent personal liking for military studios and military men and, possibly, (c) a longrange (but unexpressed) desire to play come kind of advisory role in a rovived Gorman Defense Ministry or ultimate General Staff structure. His occasional references to the Abwohr show a professiona interest in intelligence work as such; however, there is no indication that this is a basic motivation nor is there any sign that be has been in contact with other post-war intelligence organizations. He is unknown to ZI-TMR, although several others on the Gesellschaft board of directors have ZIPFER connections - one, in fact, is a listed ZIPFER agent. There is also no clear ground for collect that Classon has been notivated by financial considerations. He was earning a comfortable living when persuaded to make the change to Munich. As a matter of incidental interest, he does not expect to be able to return to his former work when the QKSMTICH termination is a inished since the Duesseldorf firm is aware that he has been "working for the Americans" and would be reluctant to take him back.

PERSONAL INTEGRITT: Dr. Classen's honosty has been tested in many ways. Ho has precisely acc unted for all Gesellschaft activities and each month has turned over for case officer inspection the complete financial records of the organization, including bank statements, receipted bills, etc. He has regularly presented almost verbatin transcripts of Gesellschaft board meetings as well as copies of office correspondence and original activity reports turned in on a monthly basis by local Opsellschaft chapters. In addition, GKFENCE has maintained (via CIS) a fell mail and telephone intercept—control over the Genellschaft without producing evidence that

Classon ence turned in an intelligence report on pro-Communist votorans! or mulzations which the case officer recognized as a SIFPER product. When casually soked later for the source of his information, Classon without hesitation said it had come from ZIPPER via a member of the Cosellschaft board who has close ties with that group.

CHARACTER: Again, the writer's short personal relationship with the egent is a limiting factor in a full consideration of his character. Ir. Classen is a scholarly, comewhat quiet and unobtrusive man of obviously high intelligence and education. His standard of living (the writer has seen his quarters) appears to be understely confortable and certainly not out of line with his income. His extensive library, dating from professorial days, arone an academic interest in political science and geopolitics and includes a lar to selection of standard American works on the subject. ("is inclish is excellent.) From all appearances, he is devoted to his wife and children and leads a quiet family life. Ho known excesses. Intorcepts of his office correspondence of ow a fairly wide - and innocuous - acquaintanceship with influential rersons in many walks of life but no close or suspect relationships. State Secretary Long in the office of Chancellor Adenguer is a personal friend, though probably not a close one. His relations to with the writer, as well as with the previous case efficer, has been served by an open-minded, frank and friendly coope ativeness. He has willingly done everything asked of him, including the recent distatostful task (which was embarassing to him) of forcing General Pelix Steiner to withdraw from active participation in Cesellschaft affairs bacause of his obnemious 33 background and frequent indiscrptions which ands him persons non grata to OPC. Ironically, this long-desired step was completed during the same week that the decision was taken to terminate support of this project.
