REVEREND STOJILKO KAJEVIC,
ALSO KNOWN AS STONE KAY

Reverend Stojilko Kajevic, 3950 North Lake Shore Drive, Chicago, Illinois, is a Serbian national born in Yugoslavia on July 29, 1935, and he is a Serbian Orthodox priest assigned to Saint Nikola's Serbian Orthodox Church, 2754 South Central Park Avenue, Chicago. He obtained United States citizenship at Chicago, on April 4, 1972, and then had his name changed to Stone Kay. A confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, has advised that Kajevic was a member of the secret Serbian emigre society known as "Srpski Oslobodilacki Pokret" "Otadzbina" (Serbian Liberation Movement "Fatherland"), which is also referred to as "SOPO". This source had advised that "SOPO" was responsible for the bombings of the Yugoslav diplomatic establishments in the United States and Canada, in January, 1967.

A second confidential source, who has furnished reliable information in the past, advised in July, 1972, that Kajevic had recently claimed responsibility for the June 16, 1972, bombing of the Yugoslav Consulate in Munich, West Germany. This source also said Kajevic claimed that his apprehension in Paris, France, in late June, 1972, prevented him and his Serbian associates from bombing the Yugoslav Embassy in Paris.

This second confidential source advised on November 12, 1972, that Kajevic is now in need of funds, and is attempting to raise money for another visit to West Europe. This source advised that Kajevic has recently been telling associates in Chicago that he wishes to return to Paris to obtain revenge against the Serbian emigre in that city who informed the French authorities of his plans for bombing the Yugoslav Embassy in Paris. Kajevic has also recently stated that he was lucky the French authorities did not locate a suitcase of his containing material to be used in that bombing, when they arrested him in Paris in late June, 1972. source has also learned that Kajevic recently attempted to make contact in Chicago with Momcilo Djujic a former general in the Serbian Chetnik forces in Yugoslavia in World War II. This source does not know if these two individuals actually met, and source said Djujic now heads a Serbian emigre organization known as "Pokret Srpskih Chetnika" (Movement of Serbian Chetniks). Source advised that Djujic has many followers in West Europe, and described Djujic as almost as wild as Kajevic in talking about military action to be taken against the present Yugoslav government. Source also stated that Kajevic's statements about bombings of Yugoslav diplomatic establishments in West Europe in 1972, may be nothing more than pure talk on his part. Source said Kajevic is not above fabrication in order to impress his followers, but source also pointed out that Kajevic is also capable of violence.

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
