Dear Mr. ZLATAREVE

About a month and a half age I wrote to you and have had no reply yet. It may be you have not received my letter.

I had promised to write you additionally on the question of the (one word illegible). I was hopeful that the persons of whom I told you will write but I have not heard from them yet. May be I will soon have the possibility to get in touch with them again and then I will be able to tell you some definite news. (t.n. - this paragraph is crossed out.).

DOCHEV and some time earlier I heard from Mr. Yordan PEEV from Paris.

They both write about the unification of the Bulgarian national emigrants. In reply I wrote them back and todl them the unification must be achieved the soonest possible. I believe that on the basis of fighting communism until it is ammibilated and reestablishing of the Turnovo Constitution, there will be no differentiations maintained among the governing bodies of the enigrants in the various countries. There will probably be disagreements as to who will be the leaders. However, everything possible should be done to reach an agreement on the matter. Mr. DOCHEV writes, the Fladme members are attempting to obstruct the unification. He does not mention what manner were these attempts. (If possible please let me know what they are). They are probably trying to cause splits through intrigues and gossips. They are specialists in that respect. I know some of them.

In my opinion the unification must be a complete union, i.e. it must include all the organizations of the nationalist emigrante and all political party movements, namely: the organization

I was born in the visinity of Karlovo. Our family is in Karlovo (the rose valley) and is very well known there because on my father's side we are related to EVSKI. Hy mother is from Kalofer, from STRANSKI's family. I am 15 years old and have studied engineering and trade and finance in Hanover together with Col. Dancho ATANASOV and in Berlin with the generals KRASHOVSKE, COCHEV, PISKOV, DZHANGAZOV about whom I have not beard for a long time. When we were studying they were captains. At that time I was president of the Bulgaria: National Student Association in Germany (1927 - 1929) and later become the president of the International Student Association in Berlin (1929).

In our house in Karlovo lived for about 6 months den) KANDIOS and his staff as political fugitives from Greece. They were very pleased with the living quarters and with my sunt (my father's sister) who was taking care of them. Her name is DUSHLIEVA, maiden name ZIA TAREVA. If you can please let me have Hr. KAMENOS' address.

After the Americans set me free of serfdom, I participated in establishing the Munich National Club and with Ivan DOCHEV and other nationalist Bulgarians we found the Bulgarian National Front. I am corresponding with Alexander TSANKOV. He is in South America. He wants to come back. I also correspond with Khristo STATEV and a number of other Bulgarian public workers. I have been writing to Col. VELIZAROV, as well. The necessity of uniting all national forces, beginning with the Agrerians to the most outspoken nationalists, made me issue the booklet I am sending.

Will you please let me have your biography. Let me know whether with your help and manuscript not more than two tried friends of yours you can give us information on conditions in Bulgaria from Greece. We must start getting ready because the events are taking a speedy pace.
