Editorial at the very beginning and until the middle of 1941 founder Carroll Hunt. From then onwards "Asians" 's A. Johnson, later still American-educated Tom Harada, who afterwards replaced Dr. Goya in issuing passes to Jewish refugees in Shanghai.

It was never dangerous, nor was its circulation great during this period. However it still tended to glorify Japan and the South East Asian other things.

(I) Mrs. ROBBIE or "Robbie". German by birth, American by marriage, former owner of Radio Station KJHS and later pro-Japanese broadcaster and announcer over Jap. controlled Radio Station WJHS. On the first or second anniversary of the Pacific War, according to "Asiana" she radio-casted a commemorative program to celebrate the occasion. She did not go to concentration camp.

(II) JIMMY LADD - for some time broadcaster over Shanghai's Japanese owned XGOL, after the beginning of the Pacific War.

(III) RON BISHOP who it is alleged sometime in his life served in the Marine Corps. He was until very recently, second newscaster at WJHS. After the beginning of the Pacific War he suddenly became "YANK LASH" and stayed out of camp.

ASSOCIATED: WOMAN # 2 - LEWIS head of the "PACIFIC AUSTRALIAN MOVEMENT" in Shanghai, broadcast, over German and Japanese stations on short-wave frequencies to persuade Australia to secede from "Heaven" Britain and join Japan. Initially as a camouflage measure joined the student body of St. John's University. Never went to camp.
