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ASIAN PROPAGANDA COMMUNICATORS

GERMANS: (1) Willy Osiander or "Hobbius". German by birth, American by marriage, former owner of radio station X-JB and later pro-Japanese broadcaster and announcer over Jap. controlled radio station X-MB. On the first or second anniversary of the Pacific War, according to "Asiana" she radio-broadcast a commemorative program to celebrate the occasion. She did not go to concentration camp.

(2) Willy Kroll - for some time broadcaster over Shanghai's Japanese owned XGQI, after the beginning of the Pacific War.

(3) Tom Smith who it is alleged sometime in his life served in the Airline Corps. He was until very recently, second newscaster at NBC. After the beginning of the Pacific War he suddenly became "Yank I.J.S.H" and stayed out of camp.

AUSTRALIAN: John R. Wilson head of the "PAUL AUSTRALIAN BROADCAST" in Shanghai, broadcasting over German and Japanese stations on short-wave frequencies to persuade Australia to secede from "Mother" Britain and join Japan. Lately as a camouflage measure joined the student body of St. John's University. Never went to camp.
