1. The Peruvian political figures now in Buenos Aires are not believed to be focal points around which an anti-Odría movement might originate.
2. The two most important Peruvian political figures in Argentina are General Federico Hurtado and General Antonio Luna Ferreccio, who is the present Peruvian Ambassador. Both Hurtado and Luna are satisfied with their lives in Buenos Aires, even though they consider themselves political exiles. Hurtado criticizes the military junta in guarded terms and he does not discuss Peruvian politics with anyone he does not know well. He appears to be on good terms with Luna.
3. When former President Bustamante was in Buenos Aires, he did not attempt to organize any revolutionary movement against the junta. Although he was outspoken in his criticism of Odría, his political activities were limited to keeping in touch with Manuel Prado in Europe and with Jose Cessada in Lima. After Bustamante left Argentina for the United States there was even less reason for an anti-Odría movement to take shape in Buenos Aires.
4. [] In view of the enmity between the Peron regime and the Peruvian Apristas, Buenos Aires is not a propitious place for an important concentration of Aprista exiles.
5. The only individual in the Peruvian Embassy in Buenos Aires who appears to be a staunch Odría supporter is Italo Molinari, commercial counselor. The rest of the staff is largely apathetic. Molinari is not believed to be well liked by Argentine authorities. [] Any confidential political or commercial talks between Argentina and Peru would take place in Lima rather than in Buenos Aires.
