

AFGHANISTAN: Anniversary of Invasion

Kabul was relatively quiet and security precautions were not increased on the anniversary of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan last Saturday. The insurgents' call for a general strike was largely ignored by the populace, although the shopkeepers opened slightly later than usual.

The Soviets marked the anniversary by claiming insurgent activity is declining. Prime Minister Babrak noted the occasion in a speech in which he offered to extend the amnesty for those who fled the country. About 100 political prisoners were released. Afghan refugees demonstrated in a few world capitals and temporarily entered the Soviet Embassy grounds in Tehran. Egyptian president Sadat reaffirmed his support of the insurgents and promised to send more arms and relief supplies.
