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
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Rwanda:

Cease-Fire Talks Stalled

There are no signs of a breakthrough. In addition to demanding the resignation of the military-appointed interim government, the Tutsidominated Rwandan Patriotic Front (RPF) now insists that the 600-strong Presidential Guard be dissolved and that joint security patrols of the RPF, the government, and UN forces be formed before negotiations can begin again.

- The government side seems unlikely for now to accept these conditions.
- A protracted struggle for Kigali may unravel the RPF's command and control and increase the chance of Tutsi reprisals on Hutu civilians in the capital and the countryside.
- If and when a cease-fire is reached, the Hutu senior command is likely to have difficulty controlling rogue elements of the military and Hutu civilians intent on killing Tutsis.
