IDENTIFICATION OF THE COMMAND

(Before each Roman numeral will be placed the name of the operation with which it is registered in the General Plan)

- I.- Chief of the Garrison or Quarters, on active duty with the Government, but a friend of ours
- II .- Executive Officer, same as above
- III. Our Military Commander, commandant of our forces in the respective zone
- IV .- Our Military Executive Officer, same as above
- VI- Commander of the Shock Troops (forces organized abroad)
- VII -- Executive Officer of the Shock Troops, as above

STAR.-ORGANIZER of interior forces in the indicated zone. Together with III they will be in charge of the organization and command of those forces, for which they will be given concrete instructions and a determined plan.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR STAR

- . To have two appropriate and safe places for the instruction of our people;
- 2.- To receive the Instructor and take charge of his lodging and security, furnishing him all henceds, avoiding his going out, bearing in mind that he has entered and will work clandestinely;
- 3.- To regulate the instruction with the Instructor, giving preference to the SECURTOY AND EFFICIENCY FACTOR, assuring the success of this mission;
- CONVENIENT FORM, to be distributed with the greatest dexterity at the moment arranged. To have in the same place two cans of gasoline (5-gallon cans), sufficient rags and oil three for cleaning and lubricating the arms with sufficient anticipation according to the day of its distribution. He must also have a strong, sharp knife to break the wrapping. The equipment as it is can be buried or put in the water without being ruined.
- c.- Of that equipment to assign one arm of each type for giving the instruction, things that he must keep in the places of instruction; and, in case they are discovered by the police, these arms will be burned with gasoline, being damaged in order that they may not be used.

- 6.- To furnish to the Instructor the instruction material and the people. They must be carefully selected in groups that will not arouse suspicion. These groups, as far as possible, should be instructed in one day, without going out to return, so that once they have been instructed and are SUFFICIENTLY WARNED ABOUT DISCRETION, they may go to their ordinary work.
- 7.- He will maintain a constant service of vigilance while the instruction is being given and, as far as possible, will keep control of those already trained in order to avoid indiscretions and disorganization.
- 8.- In the company of the Instructor he will designate an individual in each group of ten to be leader and in charge of the group, with the obligation of controlling their directions and discretion, so that at any moment he can assemble the group and be ready to act.
- 9.- "STAR" will inform III of the results of the instruction, of the measures he will orders to give strict fulfillment to these instructions and of the way III can collaborate with him for the better success of this important mission.
- 10.- To resolve with intelligence and decision any situation that offers danger, remembering that the SECURITY OF THE CAUSE IS THE FIRST THING.

IMPORTANT: The SABOTAGE Groups are designated with the letters A, B, C, etc., preceded by the hame of the operation according to the General Plan. In the Capital there will be a GENERAL COORDINATOR OF SA BOTAGE (CORGESA).—

In each Zone or Sector, the command is performed by: either I, of III, according to arrangements by the High Command.

FOR THE INSTRUCTOR

Training Program and Tentative Schedule of Instruction

- 1.- To receive and organize the people furnished by STAR. Each group of instruction will consist of 10 men, who will enter the instruction place at 7:00 a.m. and will leave at 8:00 p.m. The purpose of this is that THEY SHOULD NOT BE ENTERING AND LEAVING for any reason and that THEY NOT BE SEEN AGAIN around such a place. This measure is for security, and the Instructor and STAR will take all security measures they consider appropriate in order to cover this IMPORTANT FACTOR. In each instruction group he will designate one who will serve as leader and take charge of controlling the directions of his men, their discretion and unity, in order that they may be ready at the moment when they are needed.
- 2.- He will designate immediately a man who will serve as his INSTRUCTION ASSISTANT, in order that he may help him to make the instruction a practical training and as efficacions as possible.

3.- Tentative Schedule to be put into practice:

- a) 7:30 a.m. To inculcate in the person the spirit of sacrifice and rigurous discipline as an essential factor for carrying out an undertaking. The greatness of our cause and its absolute justice require sacrifice of us; but that will be unfruitful if discipline is lacking.

 Our undertaking is safe; the triumph will be ours, but it is necessary that each one fulfill exactly what is entrusted to him and only that, but realizing when, where and how it is ordered.

 The clutely secrecy is a matter of life or death in our organization, and to keep it with absolute security, one must not drink liquor, have confidences, have relations with women or any irresponsible person who may prejudice our discretion; all indiscretion will be serious for our LIBERATING CAUSE.
- b) 7:30 to 8:00 a.m. Characteristics of fire arms. Generalities
- c) 8:00 to 9:00 a.m. RIFLE: Nomenclature, assembly and disassembly; form of carrying it and using it; shooting positions; motionless, crawling, on the field, in town, etc. Safety. Charge.
- d) 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. MADZEN machinegun; similar to above.
- e) 10:00 to 11:00 a.m. DANISH machinegun; similar to above.
- f) 11:00 to 12:00 a.m. Hand grenades; fragmentation and concussion; nomenclature; safety; throwing; use; (Practise with an appropriate weight)
- g) 12:00 to 2:00 p.m. Rest and lunch, WITHOUT GOING OUT.
- h) 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. DEGYTROV light machinegun; characteristics; nomenclature; gun position; firing positions; rapid charge of the magazines. Use of the spare barreh.
- i) 3:00 to 4:00 p.m. SABOTAGE: workmanship and calculation of the charges; manner of operating; form in which the explosive works; use of the cap and electric detonator and other characteristics of this kind of operation.
- j) 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. General conversation with the Group, in which the Instructor and his Assistant will answer questions and estimate whether the course has been learned and the practical results of the instruction. In this conversation a classification of the personnel according to their aptitudes will be made in order that the most complete report possible about the ability of each man may be made to STAR.
- k) 6:00 to 7:00 p.m. Dinner and rest.
- 1) 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. Explanation of the DECALOGUE OF THE EFFECTIVE

COMBATANT. To repeat all that refers to security, discretion, discipline and spirit of sacrifice.

4.- Special instruction will be given in the manner of conducting oneself in action in order to attain unity of thought and effort in the task assigned. Cohesion in fighting must distinguish the soldiers of the Liberating Army, putting aside susceptibilities, ambitions or personal troubles. Obedience must be absolute and courage permanent.

DECALOGUE OF THE EFFECTIVE COMBATANT

- 1.- To keep courage firm and obedience alert.
- 2.- To be exact in reports and cautious in estimating them.
- 3.- NOT TO GET DRUNK.
- 4.- To give all possible aid to a wounded comrade.
- 5.- Not to stain the prestige of THE CAUSE. Not to commit an action that will harm the civilian population.
- 6.- To understand that SECRECY is part of SECURITY and necessary for success.
- 7.- To take advantage of terrain features to hide from the sight and fire of the enemy.
- 8.- To shoot only against a localized enemy target.
- 9.- Not to waste food, fuel and other equipment.
- 10.- Too coordinate his task with that of his mission comrades to assure their strict fulfillment.

This DECALOGUE must be consulted constantly, it being understood that triumph depends upon its rigorous observance.
