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SUBJECT: Activities in Tanzania

ZAMBIA

1. Attached are Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania, newspaper articles on the visit of the delegation from the United States-based National African Liberation Support Committee (ALSC) to Tanzania. The delegation, consisting of Howard Lamar FULLER, Gene LOCKE and Brenda PARIS, arrived in Tanzania on 24 August 1973 for a five day visit as guests of the Tanganyika African National Union (TANU). The delegation was scheduled to depart Tanzania 1 September 1973 for Zambia. The articles may be considered unclassified when separated from this memorandum.

During their stay in the country, they hope to consult officials of liberation movements on how activities and programmes of the committee could best be co-ordinated with the liberation struggle on the continent.

On May 26, African Liberation Day, the committee planned and co-ordinated demonstrations in the US, Canada and the Caribbean, during which over 300,000/- was raised to assist Africa's freedom fighters.

A DELEGATION from the US-based African Liberation Support Committee (ALSC) arrived in Dar es Salaam yesterday to present 300,000/- to liberation movements.

The delegation is led by the Chairman of the committee, Mr. Gene Locke. The other members are the former Chairman of the committee, Mr. Owusu Sadaukai, and the committee's Secretary, Miss Brenda Paris.

Talking to reporters at Dar es Salaam International Airport, Mr. Locke said the aim of their trip to Africa was not only to present the money to the liberation movements, but also to talk to the OAU Liberation Committee about how the ALSC can effectively support the movements. He said that this would also give them an opportunity to get a real picture of the activities of the movements.

Mr. Locke further said that 80 per cent of the money will go to Frelimo, Zanu and Zapu, PAIGC and Unita. Unita is an Angolan organisation not recognised by the OAU.

The other 20 per cent will be given to the movement most in need of money. "This will be decided after we have had talks with the liberation movements," he said.

Mr. Locke said the ALSC has 33 offices (chapters) in the United States, Canada and the Caribbean and one in Dar es Salaam. The organisation engages itself in raising money for liberation movements in Southern Africa and Guinea Bissau, conducts educational seminars and programmes, and distributes literature, films and other educational materials.

The 300,000/- was raised in May by organising dances and other activities.

The delegation, which is a guest of Tanu, will be in Tanzania for five days.

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# OWUSU COMES AS PARTY GUEST

# Words alone won't help liberation

"IT IS not enough that we give verbal support for the struggle for national liberation in southern Africa. We must show commitment by making material and tangible contribution."

This is the message that Mr. Gene Locke, newly elected chairman of the African Liberation Support Committee (ALSC) conveyed to students at the Kibaha Education Centre.

Mr. Owuzu Sadaukal, a member of the ALSC executive committee, however struck a note of caution by saying: "It is people who win struggle and not money or weapons. All the weapons and bombs could not defeat the people of Vietnam who were determined to be free."

He believed that Africa would one day be controlled by the workers and peasants and it will be "Africa which would befit us as human beings."

Asked whether the ALSC stood for an independent black state in the U.S., Mr. Sadaukal said: "Under capitalism this was not possible and it is our task to replace the present capitalist regime with a socialist one."

Mr. Sadaukal added however: "Once we have achieved our objective of the change of the regime, we reserve the right of self-determination, for even then racism will still prevail."

On how the Afro-Americans who are a minority could expect to overthrow the American imperialist, Mr. Sadaukal said that there was also a large section of the whites who were also oppressed and exploited.

"At a certain stage unity will be forged. But in this unity the black workers will play a vanguard role because they form the most oppressed and exploited section of the American people," he declared.

# ALSC: Boost for struggling brothers

AN EVENT has been taking place in Tanzania which I would like all Africans to appreciate it for what it is. The event is the visit of representatives of the U.S.-based African Liberation Support Committee.

The visit is a visit with a difference. It is a visit that is not purely devoted to speech making. It is a visit that is not concerned with reciting litanies about African oppression. It is a visit of true solidarity.

For the representative of the A.L.S.C. have come with 300,000/- as a donation to African Liberation Movements. The other day we read in the newspapers that already, they have given 58,000/- to the fighting and heroic Front for the Liberation of Mozambique.

This is extremely significant. It shows that Africans everywhere are quickly realising that it is not enough to simply talk about our oppression and exploitation. It is necessary to act and act concretely.

The revolutionary gesture of the African Liberation Support Committee is far better than the million errands of those who masquerade from one African capital to another behaving more as messengers of the ideological neo-imperialists than true African revolutionaries.

Africans cannot behave this way. For they have a continent to liberate. They have a people to emancipate. This does not mean they should not look beyond their noses. What it means

is that Africans must get their revolutionary priorities correct.

We Africans cannot at this stage pretend that we are citizens of the world and concentrate ourselves on that effort. That would be immature. It would be bankruptcy. For this vast continent has yet to be liberated.

For us Africans, there is no life outside the African Revolution. There is no friendship, no comradeship, no brotherhood

and no solidarity outside this struggle to liberate mother Africa.

I cannot think of a brother who does not want to participate in the hot struggle to free Africa from exploitation, oppression and all forms of weaknesses. I cannot think of an African who wants to fight for the liberation of our continent from rostruma outside where the struggle is taking place — in Africa.

Not every African can take up a gun and fight for the liberation of Africa. But Africans can contribute to the struggle through other concrete deeds that exclude mere talking. Certainly for those who call themselves African revolutionaries, the responsibility is even much more greater.

African revolutionaries cannot content themselves with the bu-

siness of merely dramatising concepts. For in Africa, there are problems to grapple with. There are issues to be settled. There are injustices to be liquidated. There are inhuman forces to be eliminated. This cannot be done by merely emphasising on concepts. There is fighting to be done. There is a struggle to be waged.

This struggle must be prosecuted in concrete terms.

Theory and practice are interrelated. They are inseparable. To emphasise theory without practice is dogmatism. To concentrate on practice forgetting theory is adventurism. Let us leave the world of dogmas to those who believe in ghosts. Let us leave the world of adventurism to the bare-handed hunters!

As the Tanu Guidelines point out: "We have been oppressed

a great deal, we have been exploited a great deal and we have been disregarded a great deal. It is our weakness that has led to our being oppressed, exploited and disregarded. We now intend to bring about a revolution which will ensure that we are never again victims of these things".

The necessity of waging an African Revolution makes it imperative for us to demonstrate our commitment by making material and tangible contribution to the struggle.

That is why we must hail our brothers of the African Liberation Support Committee for their latest contribution to the African cause. We can only wish that they will continue on this correct path.

Long live the African Revolution! The people of Africa shall win.
