2 USSR: Brezhnev came off best in the personnel changes approved on Monday by the party Central Committee. Two of his cronies, Shelepin and Demichev, were elevated to the Presidium. Koslov, an old antagonist, was expelled from the ruling body.

Kosygin does not appear to have improved his position, and the dual leadership charade acted out since Khrushchev's going may be about over.


Podgorny, however, also strengthened his position, and remains the leading rival to Brezhnev within the party. One of his protegés, Shelest, also made the Presidium yesterday. Podgorny played a leading role at the meeting.

Shelepin, who has roots in the police and "State Control" (inspector general) apparatus, appears to be a comer in his own right.


The Central Committee decided to reverse Khrushchev's 1962 action to divide the party into two virtually separate organizations, one for agriculture and the other for industry. As was the case when the scheme was put into effect back in 1962, the reversal will probably breed severe dislocations.

7. Laos: We would not be surprised by a new Communist offensive in Laos in retaliation for government gains in recent months.

Meo tribesmen who keep a watch on Route 7 report that large numbers of trucks continue to make the trip to the Plaine des Jarres from North Vietnam. Last Saturday the tribesmen spotted a 120-truck convoy, the largest since the present Communist resupply activity got going in late September. Attempts by the Lao Air Force to cut down on this traffic have not been effective.

Coup rumors are being heard once again in Vientiane. Most of the rumors have little substance, but they do show that the same old jealousies are keeping the Souvanna government as unstable as ever.

8. Cambodia: Sihanouk's latest threats to close the US Embassy appear to have been mostly bombast.

On Monday the Cambodians agreed to a US suggestion for bilateral talks in a third-country capital. Sihanouk, probably trying to give the impression that the US is seeking an accommodation, immediately told the press about it.

Cuba-US: Now that the US elections are 12. over, the Cubans seem to be warming up for a new war of nerves on the overflight problem.

Bolivia: We have been told that the 13. junta will soon be recognized by Argentina and Brazil. Their lead will probably be followed quickly by other Latin American states who had waited for their initiative.

Recognition will probably give a temporary boost to the Barrientos regime's prestige at home. Opposition elements, however, will continue trying to build their strength for an eventual showdown with the junta.

- 14. <u>Israel-Syria:</u> The border area has been relatively quiet since last Friday's clash, and we have seen no signs of any large-scale buildup of forces. Tempers have been aroused on both sides, however, and a new incident could lead to a serious escalation of the fighting.
- 15. Iraq: The new cabinet announced on Saturday strengthens the position of Iraq's pro-Nasirists, who have been urging closer union with Egypt. Antiunion feeling is still strong in the army and throughout the country, however, and the issue is far from being resolved.
