

#### LAOS

Early yesterday government forces at Xieng Khouang airstrip--the government's main command post on the Plaine des Jarres--rebuffed the second major assault in a week. Communist forces continue to move onto the Plaine, however, and now encircle the airstrip making it necessary to airdrop most of the supplies to the estimated 2,000 government troops defending the base.

We continue to believe that the North Vietnamese are willing to accept whatever
losses are necessary to overrun the base,
a price the government's forces cannot
afford. Possession of the airstrip is
crucial to the control of the Plaine and
the Communists apparently are committed
to its capture.

The enemy also is maintaining military pressure elsewhere in the country. In the northern panhandle government positions outside of Paksane continue to receive hit and run attacks and further south a North Vietnamese battalion has clashed with government forces in the Ban Tang Vai area.

The increased enemy activity in various parts of the country probably is intended to discourage the government from diverting too many of its troops to the Plaine area.

### **PHILIPPINES**

The disturbances at our embassy yesterday may have had official encouragement. Despite attempts by the leaders of an otherwise peaceful downtown student rally to head them off, some 200 to 300 radicals broke away and proceeded to the embassy. Manila radio stations-perhaps inspired by the presidential palace-all day had been predicting that the students would march on the embassy. The government knew the demonstrations were coming, but no Philippine security forces were on hand around the embassy. When the embassy asked for help, it was very slow in coming.
