1. Laos

a. The Polish member seems to have maneuvered the ICC into including an inspection of Air America in a package inspection proposal which would go to the Laotian government for concurrence. The Indian chairman—"with tears in his eyes"—told Ambassador Unger on Saturday that withdrawing Air America from the package could well lead to the break-up of the ICC.

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· 2. Iraq

- a. The new regime is in control and is talking of an early return to civilian government. Gunfire, however, continues.
- b. The government is dominated by the socialist Baath Party. Five cabinet members were educated in American universities and one in London. The defense minister was military attache in Washington in 1957-58.
- c. The cabinet includes several Kurds, and Mulla Mustafa Al-Barzani has chimed in with a message of support. A greater measure of Kurdish autonomy may be in sight and with it the end of the Kurdish rebellion. Baghdad has ordered the release from prison of "Kurdish detainees" along with all other "non-Communist" detainees.
- d. Communist demonstrations have so far been crushed by the military

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e. Moscow and Peiping in their news treatment of the revolt have carefully restricted themselves to factual reporting.

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- f. On Sunday the US Embassy in Baghdad, in reporting that the city was relatively calm except for sporadic shooting during the roundup of Communists, noted that "Communist embassies are evidently frightened, with women and children concentrated in the compounds."
- g. Arab countries have raced to recognize the government. Iraq's neighbors are nonetheless still extremely nervous over possible repercussions on their own internal security and their forces are still alerted. Hussein is concerned over Cairo's "Voice of the Arab Nation" broadcasts calling for revolts in Jordan and Syria and there have been further pro-Nasir demonstrations in Syria, where the situation has been restless for some weeks.

the "killing of Communists," with
"no mercy for a Red, an Englishman
or any other agent."

3. Cuba

a. Analysis so far of the photos of the KHIMIK ZELINSKY suggests that neither combat aircraft nor strategic missiles were in its cargo.

b. However, there seems to be little question that military support items for Soviet and Cuban forces were unloaded, including at least some 130 jeep-like vehicles. Some have apparently been convoyed to a camp two miles from Torrens, a major Soviet headquarters area near Havana.
