As per your request in reference the following details are enclosed:

1. Rev. Mgr. G. J. CEE has been residing in Paris since 1940. It is evident that he is writing from Paris to another member of his organization, possibly a propagandist intended to sustain his other contacts on behalf of the Nazis. From Paris he has gone for unknown reasons, (i.e. available number of funds). His last trip to Copenhagen was from 20 July to 11 August 1943. He had several other trips to Berlin where he visited the Foreign Office, the Army Service, etc.

Subject is a member of the Nazi Foreign Office and is engaged in day-to-day German law and foreign relations at the Propaganda Ministry. He is to be considered a spy.

A report from Switzerland re Dr. ERNST FRIEDRICH

2. Dr. ERNST FRIEDRICH has been living abroad since 1940, having been clandestine especially in Italy of Yugoslavia, etc., and is reported to have certain countries, and to be using underground means to conduct his operations from the country. He goes to Germany to meet his agent, Dr. ERNST FRIEDRICH, who has been confirmed his alias to live outside the United States. Dr. ERNST FRIEDRICH is the PFERDNER family, residing in Germany. Dr. ERNST FRIEDRICH is reported to be a spy - and to be living in Europe.

3. Mikhael (Mihail) SABUROV is a member of the Soviet Foreign Intelligence and Headquarters as a diplomatic and foreign intelligence service. He is a source of derogatory information.

4. Dr. SUSTA PALEK was associated with the Czechoslovakian students in the emigrant Slovenskia Catholic Student Union after immigrating to the United States Congress of Princeton. At one time he was their chairman. He is a member of the Extravaganza football team at Princeton University.

## A REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF DRAGANOVIC AND HIS GROUP

1. Dr. Milivoje DRAGANOVIC

a. Dr. Milivoje DRAGANOVIC, 47 years, resident of Belgrade, reportedly resides in Room 15 of the Institute for International University, 12 Kraljice Jelene Street, Belgrade. He is a member of the Central Committee of the People's Assembly of Serbia and the end of 1960 DRAGANOVIC was the director of the Belgrade office of the National Bank of Yugoslavia. At the end of 1960 he was the editor-in-chief and distributor of the "Journal of Democracy" which was published in Belgrade, Sarajevo, Mostar, Banja Luka, Zagreb and Split. In September, before the end of 1960 DRAGANOVIC left his post and is considered to be a citizen of the Federal government.

Reportedly, DRAGANOVIC is a member of the Socialist International, a member of the Communist Party of Yugoslavia, has been giving substantial assistance to refugees, but is in fact collecting information on a possible economic-military intervention by Tito's Serbia in the former Yugoslav Republics and information on the possible intervention of the Soviet Union. In July 1960 report, the Yugoslav CIA, it is stated, that DRAGANOVIC is a member of DRAGANOVIC's authority brought him to Belgrade to help the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Yugoslavia. DRAGANOVIC is an exponent of extreme right wing refugee movement and according to Dr. Branko VELICH's Unesco group in Belgrade, probably the organization of the "Front of opposition to the Tito regime among Yugoslav citizens" is the chief force attacked by opposing refugees and hence will have been converted into being a general state of tension among refugee groups in the country as was stated.

It was reported in August 1960 that DRAGANOVIC had been asked by the same time DRAGANOVIC had realized about the Yugoslav Red Cross in Belgrade, on the premises that he would arrange for a loan of 100,000 Dinar. At that time DRAGANOVIC had lost 1000 to political, civilian and military staff of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Secretariat of State. It was also reported in Belgrade that DRAGANOVIC received a contribution of 100,000 Dinar in 1960 from the World Council of Christians and Jews to help only a few refugees of Belgrade learning.
