BASIC CONSIDERATIONS**

Preface

War is the very essence of extravagance and waste. Radio Free Asia -- like the other operating branches of the Committee for a Free Asia -- exists to prevent another devastating war. This activity is in itself a form of warfare. While it is incalculably less costly in human lives and dollars, it is nevertheless costly because it must operate with swiftness to control the enemy's blow.

We are faced with an adversary that is spending far more than we are to win the cold war in Asia. This budget represents our estimate of the cost to effectively control the enemy within the potential of the medium of broadcasting. It is a compromise between the costliness of operating with the utmost speed and those principles of sound business management inherent in American industry. With these considerations in mind, we have this budget with a single objective in mind: to reach the largest number of persons possible with our message at the lowest possible cost.

The Audience

Reliable data on the distribution of radio receiving sets in Asia are difficult to obtain. The best we have at this moment would indicate the presence of 14,327,300 receiving sets in the area of our interest. Of these receiving sets only 1,763,900 are capable of receiving short wave programs. To estimate the potential listening audience, the first figure must be multiplied by the average number of persons who listen to a single receiving set. While there is no reliable estimate for determining this factor in Asia, it is certain to be comparatively high. The Department of State employs a factor of five with a resulting estimated audience of 72,629,000. Considering the amount of group listening in Southeast Asia, we feel that this is a modest estimate. Amplification of these data may be found in Attachment I.

Seven Transmitters

To effectively reach this potential audience, we are now considering plans for seven transmitters to be located in Bangkok, Manila, and Formosa. This plan together with the estimated costs included in the budget is the preliminary recommendation of the engineering firm of Jansky & Bailey. It is made upon the basis of studies of Jansky & Bailey and data made available to them by the engineering staff of VOA and the State Department.

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these countries, we will do so. Funds for this exploration are contained within the program budget under "Project Development."

International operations will be centered during this budget period in Manila. They will be incorporated with programming our transmitter or transmitters in Manila directed to Communist China and to those countries of Southeast Asia, to which we will not have access through national programming. This budget plans for a minimum of eight hours of programming daily. The largest proportion of this time will be programmed in four Chinese dialects to reach both the mainland and the Overseas Chinese. Approximately two hours of daily programming will be devoted to the language spoken in Burma, Malaya, Thailand, Indonesia and Indo-China.

In addition to the operations noted above, the budget has provided for a program operation in San Francisco. While this operation represents an expansion of our present San Francisco operations, it is essential for purposes of experimentation and training. A high proportion of persons carried upon our San Francisco personnel roster will be engaged in (1) training for the programming of our own transmitters, and (2) preparing those programs which cannot be prepared in the field and putting them on tape recordings for broadcast in the field.

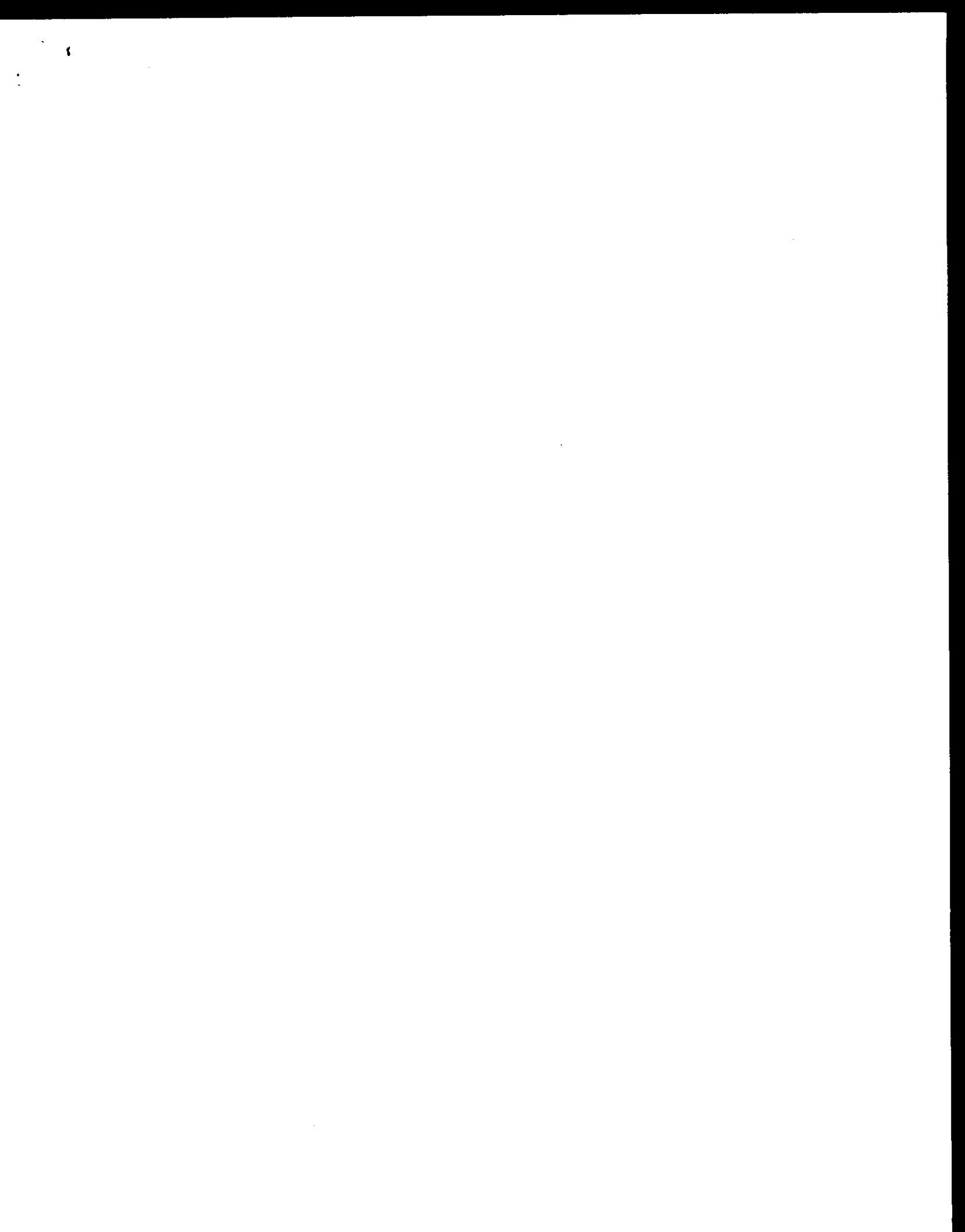
Informational Support

The effectiveness of RFA is dependent upon a continuing flow of (1) reliable news and (2) accurate intelligence. The acquisition of news is covered in the Program budget. The acquisition and evaluation of intelligence is covered in the Information budget. The latter budget provides for an intelligence gathering network composed of seven operatives and their assistants to be located in strategic cities in Asia. Because this intelligence must be evaluated as rapidly as possible, provision has been made for a group of information analysts to be located in Manila and San Francisco. The product of the information gathering and evaluation process is made available through a daily Information Bulletin to all departments and persons on the Committee having use for this material.

The balance of personnel in the Information and Reference Division of Radio Free Asia is devoted to the collection and analysis of program content materials falling outside the category of intelligence.

Summary

To fully understand this budget it must be recognized that it combines two concurrent operations: (1) the construction of facilities which will not be available during the budget period and (2) continually expanding operations upon present facilities and those facilities which we may be able to lease during the fiscal year.



The second of these operations is in a state of preparation for the time when the first operation is completed. The personnel - a total of 268 - provided for in this budget is our best estimate of the minimum number of persons required to do a fully effective job within the limitations imposed upon us by time. It is impossible to know beforehand the modifications of planning which future events may dictate, but our budget is designed to be fully flexible to meet a reasonable number of these changes. This budget for our internal guidance will be revised in the light of experience every three months.

CAPITAL EXPENSES

The following preliminary outline is the Janaky & Bailey's "best estimates of minimum transmitter and antenna system requirements for stations best capable of covering largest areas of interest from specified transmitter locations."

One map is available to show you the areas covered by primary and secondary signals. The primary area, provided all types of transmitters are in use, should give day and night coverage up to 1400 miles, and secondary area up to 2000 miles.

This report is based on Janaky & Bailey's study and information that was made available to them by the Voice of America and the State Department. Our own Executive Engineer, Royal V. Howard, has studied the report and concurs.

You will note in the following that the cost of land has not been included. We are trying to get that information at the present time.

The following is quoted directly from Janaky & Bailey's report of March 26, 1952,

Note: In all cases 300 kw and 250 kw transmitters have been selected as most economical size expressed in terms of results per dollar.

CAPITAL EXPENDITURE - 1968

RADIO RECEIVER PROJECT

RVA recognises the importance of having radio receivers to key people and groups in the countries where there is no radio. There is, therefore, included in the capital expenditure budget \$100,000 which will be used to initiate basic research to determine:

1. Present receiver set distribution.
2. The needs in the various target countries for additional receivers.
3. The best means of purchasing, distributing and servicing such receivers, and
4. Purchase and distribute, if pilot study is positive, a limited number of sets for controlled tests.

It is our understanding that between 3,000 and 6,000 receiver sets could be effectively distributed in Burma alone.
