On March 13, 1956, the files of the Central Registry, Reg 66th CIC, were checked and revealed the following information concerning SUBJECT:

OINZIAUSKAS, Kazys, born 9 January 1908 in KUPRIAI, Lithuania.

SUBJECT was employed with the Lithuanian Security Police and was a member of the Sicherheitsdienst from August 1941 until April 1944. The Sicherheitsdienst appears on the list of banned organizations published by the U.S. Displaced Persons Commission 22 June 1951. One source, whose veracity is questionable, denounces SUBJECT as being a member of the German Gestapo and taking part in a Gestapo massacre of one hundred (100) Polish professors and other officials in Vilna in late December 1943 or early January 1944. REPORT OF FINDINGS	

A United States Department of State Operations Memorandum, dated 6 July 1956 revealed the following:

The files of the Department contain no record concerning SUBJECT.

Transmitted herewith, is a copy of a letter report dated 27 June 1956 from Source "C" concerning SUBJECT.

According to a report dated 8 February 1952 from an unverified source, Kazys OINZIAUSKAS, born 9 January 1908 in Rupnys, Kr. Birzaienė, Lithuania, was a former official of the Lithuanian Security Police (q.v.). Subject was a member of the SD police until 21 January 1940. At the time of the report, Subject was unemployed and lived at Linkmenys-Oldinges, Steigal, Naujasis A 3/3. Subject earlier worked for the VILTA (Tyrimo Mokslo Išlaikinimo Komitetas - Lithuanian Committee for Liberation), but stated that he had broken off all contact with that organization. His application for emigration was rejected because he was denounced as a member of the Lithuanian Security Police during the Nazi Occupation of Lithuania.

A document of the Army report dated 19 March 1952 from an unverified source, indicated that Kazys OINZIAUSKAS, born 9 January 1908 at Linkmenys, Lithuania, joined the Lithuanian Security Police in 1932, and obtained the rank of District Chief. On 27 July 1940, he was arrested by the Russians and imprisoned until 1 June 1951. In August 1951, after the dissolution of the Lithuanian Government by the Germans, Subject re-joined the Security Police at the request of the underground. He was a member of the SD until April 1944. The report further indicated that allegations were made that Subject had participated in the massacre of one hundred Polish officials at Vilna between 1943 and 1944.

There is no information to confirm the allegation in the above paragraph.

<p>On 6 August 1950 the files of the Central Registry Division, Headquarters, 664th CIC Group, APO 154, US Army, including Dossier Number D-306678 and the Central Personality Index, were checked and revealed the following information concerning SUBJECT:</p> <p>JOB/JCT served as an official of the Lithuanian Security Police since 1932, attaining the rank of District Chief. On 27 July 1940 he was arrested by the Russians and was held in prison until he was liberated by the Germans in June 1941. After the liberation of Lithuania a Lithuanian Government was formed and JOB/JCT, again, joined the Security Police. In Aug at 1941 the provisional Lithuanian Government was dissolved by the Germans and SUBJECT was asked by the Lithuanian Underground to remain in his position so as to aid Lithuania. SUBJECT agreed and remained in the Lithuanian Sicherheitsdienst (SD) until April 1944 and held the position of a deputy Area Supervisor of VILNIUS, Lithuania. SUBJECT stated that while he held that position he never gave or signed orders for the execution of any individual. SUBJECT stated that his job consisted of fighting Communist espionage and partisans. In August 1944, when the Germans were retreating, he was taken as a laborer to dig trenches, and later was brought to Germany where he worked to the end of the war as a laborer. (7-6) SUBJECT was accused of having taken part in a Gestapo massacre of one hundred (100) or more Polish professors and other officials in VILNIUS, Lithuania. This massacre took place in December 1943 or the early part of January 1944. (7-6) A Berlin Document Center Check was run on SUBJECT on 9 June 1948 with negative results. 1. Forwarded herewith is CIC Case No. D-155 and allied papers.

2. The following information is on file with CIC: Subject was born 9 January 1908 and was in the town of Vilna, Poland during the years 1943-44. He was accused during this period of time of having taken part in a torture massacre of 100 or more Polish professors and other officials in Vilna. This massacre took place either late in December 1943, or the early part of January 1944.

3. The following statement is also on file with CIC: "I sign this voluntary that all stated hereunder is true. It is true that GIRENKAS is in BAD MUSCHENBERG and PRENDEN is in HESSEN, GERMANY in SCHLEISER or WILDEMBERG, that they all had been with German torture and they all participated in the shooting of hundreds of Polish directors, politicians, professors and other officials. This happened in VILNA in the end of 1943 or in the beginning of 1944. It is all true and I can prove it. I sign my name. JAMES VANDERKAT".

4. This investigation consists of a check of available records and background investigation within the US Occupied Zone of Germany. Verification of identity and complete establishment of applicant's reliability is not possible due to inaccessibility of records and geographic area of applicant's former residence.

Information received by this office indicates that JUANES VERNERIS, the author of the statement, is an unreliable individual. He has a reputation for disseminating people, and has been instrumental in the incitement of trouble between Latvians and Lithuanians.</p> <p>3. Further, the enclosed statement of Subject and the particulars, also included, of people who can be reasonably identified as having been in a position to know the Subject's background, tend to refute the initial allegation by VERNERIS.</p> <p>4. The information contained in the original allegation was forwarded to the War Crime Commission prior to that organization's dissolution, and no action was taken in regard to GIRENKAS.</p> <p>5. Request that this office be notified of the ultimate disposition of this case.</p>

themselves only but the Lithuanian Security Police had no touch with the Nazis. Therefore that repression that I allegedly suffered was the pure vengeance against me is nothing but a pure fabrication.

The majority of the Lithuanian Security Police had indeed to the prevention of criminals and bandits acting in the country.

My colleagues were recommended from the Lithuanian Security Police force. In July 1940 they were nationalized. Lithuania and Poland as well as the Soviet Union.

They only had two types of any sort in the repression carried out by the Germans, but to the contrary, starting my life, I have never suffered persons by means of killing them or subjecting to severe punishment or torture. And anyone under my disposition for work or training had always been appreciated by the German Police for their abilities and knowledge.

When the Germans fought against German repression and Hitler's representatives, they arrested people in Lithuania and Poland. After the defeat in the Lithuanian Republic, I was sent to Warsaw to the headquarters, and was deported to a German camp to continue studies of some warships.

Afterwards, I had to make a choice, to choose any place for the simple reason that I wanted to choose the Lithuanian people. I was from a Polish family and have been a Catholic, a perfect example of Polish patriotism.

In the spring of 1944 Germans intensified the prevention of Polish negroes in the anti-Nazi movement, and was in Warsaw, Poland, in our village, we are an official of police and has special instructions from the Gestapo. Instructions all the time.

Instructions were given by Germans, and was sent to Lithuania to report on Polish negroes who reported to Germany about us, to a Party member, to him, said that he has now a Catholic performed his duty completely and have been a Catholic, a perfect example of Polish negroes. I have asked a number of Lithuanian men who are also in the country of Poland that all my students are free.

It is clear that I was approached very severely about this because the negroes, I have never seen such a person, and was told that the Germans had to the Germans, so that the Lithuanian underground, helping German intentions, was being approached by the Germans, but especially tortured us, and suffered greatly, because of the like in Lithuania, conducting as a criminal mainly and you remember my name and to approve my address to the Germans.

Later I learnt that a few reproaches were made against me in connection with my service as a Security Police official during the German occupation in Vilnius... according to them I was blamed to have served in the German Security Police in Poland, to have issued a written order to shoot dead law Police, and to have undersigned such an order on the proclamations in Vilnius (the complainant allegedly saw my signature on them). In order to show my side I may give the following explanations in my activities during Bolshevik and German occupation in Lithuania:

1. With Lithuanian Security Police I was employed since M-31.
2. During the first occupation of Lithuania by the Bolsheviks I was imprisoned as a political prisoner from July 17th, 1940, to June 20th, 1941, i.e. till the German-Russian war broke out and I was liberated.
3. On the first day of war a temporary free Lithuania Government was established and I had to overtake the duties in Lithuanian Security Police and the State.
4. When the Lithuanian temporary Government was discharged by the German occupational authorities and the Lithuanian National Movement was taken under German control Lithuania Underground Movement asked the personnel working in Lithuania's Administration to remain in their positions, and to resist in all possible ways and sabotage German activities.
5. I have never served in the German Security Police (West).
6. While in the Lithuanian Security Police, I performed my duties in Vilnius, Lithuania's capital, from 1941 to 1946. In the country of Vilnius when it belonged to Poland I had lived till 1930 only.
7. During the German occupation I took an active part in Lithuania Anti-Nazi Resistance having performed responsible and dangerous duties. While working in the Resistance I was a member of the Military Staff of "Lietuvos Prūtis" ("Lithuanian Front"). Performing my duties at time of German occupation, I was obliged to give informations to the persons concerned of Lithuania's resistance about wrongfull occupational intentions.
8. While having occupied Lithuania the Germans carried out many repressions against native population. Thousands of Lithuanians lost their lives under these circumstances. Besides, it is well-known fact too that Neuhause, chief of the Gestapo in Vilnius, ordered to arrest 100 Police and to shoot dead ten of them, while all the rest were sent to a forced-labour camp in 1943. It was the German repressional action carried out by the Germans.

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themselves only, but the Lithuanian Security Police had no touch with the Gestapo. Therefore that reproach that I allegedly undersigned the above sentence against me is nothing but a pure fabrication.

9. The activity of the Lithuanian Security Police was limited to the persecutions of communists and bandit acting in the country. The following sections were disconnected from the Lithuanian Security Police: underground activities of Lithuanians and Police as well as Jews, they were in exceptional German disposition.

10. Not only have I ever taken any part in the repressions carried out by the Germans, but to the contrary I tried throughout my career to protect persons in hiding or helping them to free detainees, if I could or through my colleagues under my disposition. Some of them were detained by the Lithuanian Security Police for helping Lithuanians, e.g., Dr. PURVELIS, Dr. PRANA in Jonava, Dr. KALNIEKIS in Trakai.

11. Many Lithuanian policemen fought against German repressions and worked in underground. When the Germans tried to liquidate the Lithuanian underground they arrested, under others, Dr. SICKUS, Purvelis, chief of section in the Lithuanian Security Department, who worked in the underground and was deported to a German SS, not to mention other arrests of lower employees.

12. I could not give an order to shoot my colleagues for the simple reason that I had no such a right, that I guard the anti-Nazi staff of Lithuania working in the underground myself; moreover I was brought up in a religious family and have been a faithful Catholic performing my duties conscientiously.

13. In the spring of 1944 Germans intensified the persecutions of persons suspected in the anti-Nazi movement, and I was in that period, like my duties as an official of Police and hid myself, but I escaped to the Soviet Union as a Nazi.

14. When the front line of German-Lithuanian battle approached to Lithuania, I was detained by Germans and was sent to forced-labour with my wife Virginija (her name was reported to Germany where we worked in a factory (Gutehoffnungsburg) till American Army liberated us. You may see from the below attached statement of witness what was the Lithuanian underground had from itself, that I didn't really take any part in the shooting of rebels, and that all my statements are true and right.

Bearing in mind that I was reproached very severely, although the accusations were entirely invented, that I have not ever made such crimes, but, on the contrary, I devoted all my energies to the resistance activities in the Lithuanian underground sabotaging German intentions, that I was imprisoned by the Bolsheviks (and severely tortured) as well as I suffered from Germans risking my life in Lithuania and working as a slave in Germany, I kindly ask you reconsider my case and to approve my emigration to the U.S.A.

The above-numbered, nominated case, sponsored  
by the National Catholic Welfare Conference, is rejected  
by this office for the following reasons:

The CIC report reveals that the Principal Ap-  
plicant was in Vilna, Poland during the years 1943-44.  
During this period of time he was accused of participa-  
tion in a Gestapo massacre of a hundred or more Polish  
professors and other officials in Vilna. The massacre  
took place either late in December, 1943 or early in  
January, 1944. The CIC reports that it has in its pos-  
session, a statement signed by one Jozef Veliches, who  
apparently provided the information and who had actual  
knowledge of the occurrence and of the participants in  
it. The accuser claims in his statement that he can  
prove all of his accusations among which he includes  
the fact that the Principal Applicant had been a mem-  
ber of the German Gestapo during the period in question.

It should be noted that the CIC accepts the  
statements of the accuser as proof of the Principal  
Applicant's participation in a movement criminal and  
hostile to the United States and its form of Government..

For all of the foregoing reasons, therefore,  
the Principal Applicant and his family are declared in-  
eligible for admission into the United States for per-  
manent residence under Section 13 of the Displaced Per-  
sons Act of 1948, and Section 700.7 (b) of the Regula-  
tions of the Displaced Persons Commission.
