<p>In early 1967 Subject approached an officer of the Hamburg LNGOLD office and offered to join the NPD as a penetration asset for WOLADY. In May 1967 Subject was contacted by [redacted] and several meetings were held to assess Subject thoroughly and to establish his bonafides. A prolonged illness prevented Subject from becoming active in the NPD until the end of 1968. Subject began to report on NPD activities in January 1969.</p>		
2. INDICATE WHETHER SUBJECT COULD BE TURNED OVER QUICKLY AND IN A SECURE MANNER TO ANY RESPONSIBLE CASE OFFICER FOR HANDLING. IF SO, INDICATE TO WHOM.		
<p>To any WOFIRM case officer who identifies himself as a colleague of [redacted] Subject speaks some English, but the case officer preferably should be one who speaks German, and who is familiar with the history of Germany from 1933 to 1945 and with the current political scene in West Germany.</p>

SECTION II	MOTIVATION AND CONTROL
1. ESTIMATE SUBJECT'S MOTIVATION. (Be detailed, if possible cite evidence. Do not use stock comment such as "anti-communist.")	We believe Subject is sincere in wanting to prevent a regrowth of German right-wing extremism. In addition, Subject is still suffering of a guilty conscience for his role as an SS officer during the Hitler period, and he undoubtedly feels he is vindicating himself by working against right-wing extremists now. The small retainer which he is paid plays a relatively minor role in his motivation.
2. INDICATE WHAT CONTROL, IF ANY, EXISTS OVER THE SUBJECT. (If no control, or if there is a lack of real control explain.)	Subject walked in to offer his services. He is as anxious as we are to keep the relationship clandestine. Furthermore, Subject has spent years living with a guilty conscience and with the fear that some of his actions between 1933 and 1939 may come up for trial in German courts. He is grateful for, and appreciative of, the recognition which he is now getting from WOFIRM. As a result he is easily controlled.

1. COVER USED BY SUBJECT AND CASE OFFICER IN THEIR MEETINGS.	Meetings are held in Subject's home and/or the case officer's hotel room. Since the case officer speaks native German and usually wears indigenous clothes when he meets with Subject, no special cover is needed for being seen with Subject in public.
2. COVER USED BY SUBJECT IN OBTAINING HIS INFORMATION AND IN CONTACTING HIS INFORMANTS.	Subject obtains his information by virtue of his membership in the NPD and through his good personal contact with several NPD functionaries.

SECTION IV	INTELLIGENCE CONNECTIONS AND TRAINING

Subject was an officer in the SS intelligence service from 1933 to 1945. Subject worked on political subversion and later on black propaganda. His role in the SS is fairly well known. As far as has been determined, he has had no intelligence service connections since 1945.
2. LIST OTHER INDIVIDUALS (Agents, relatives, friends) WHO KNOW OF SUBJECT'S PRESENT INTELLIGENCE ACTIVITIES.	Subject's younger daughter is fully witting and approves of his contact with us.
3. EXPLAIN ANY TRAINING SUBJECT HAS HAD IN CLANDESTINE OPERATIONS.	Between 1933 and 1945 Subject had training in political subversion, sabotage, and black propaganda. He has had no training in clandestine operations since 1945.

Subject stated that he would not work for West German intelligence organs because he does not think they are doing enough against right-wing elements. Subject would conceivably cooperate with the British. He was asked, in 1949, to collaborate with the French IS but turned down the offer because he does not consider the French reliable or professional enough.

Subject's character and reliability are essentially influenced by his desire to overcome the past, and to regain self-respect. He still suffers of a guilt complex, but this, per se, speaks well for him. His security practices are above average, being based, at least partially, on his background in the SS intelligence service.	
6. EXPLAIN ANY SITUATION OR INDISCRETION IN WHICH SUBJECT MAY HAVE BEEN INVOLVED WHICH MUST BE EVALUATED FROM A CE/OPERATIONAL SECURITY VIEWPOINT. Since the German courts have closed their cases on Subject, and since his SS background, per se, makes him attractive to the NPD, there appear to be no other reasons for concern.

1. USE OF LIQUOR, DRUGS, GAMBLING, PARAMOURS. Subject is a very light drinker. He has been taking prescription tranquilizers in order to control a nervous condition which developed during the years while his cases were pending in court. Subject, a widower, has a mistress who lives in the same house, though not in the same apartment, as he does. She only has limited knowledge of his activities and is completely unwitting of his contact with us. 4
