SUBJECT: EX-PRIME MINISTER HIGASHIKIJI ON ASIA ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

(S) Enclosed is a copy of a letter of June 1, 1956 addressed by Mr. Higashikijiji to Mr. Shultz on the occasion of the latter's visit to Tokyo in early June. An attachment to the letter is a paper setting forth the purposes and organizational outline of a proposed Asia Economic Cooperative Organization, a project in which the writer has been interested for several months. Mr. Higashikijiji, as Imperial Prince until all titles except those of the Imperial family were abolished during the occupation, formed Japan's first post-war cabinet and served as Prime Minister for two months in 1945. He is now 69 years of age.

The Embassy has previously received several letters and personal calls from Mr. Higashikijiji in connection with his interest in an organization to promote Sino-economic development. It has long been apparent, however, that he has had little success in interesting other Japanese leaders in the organization which he appears to sponsor, and that he has no clear idea as to the manner in which his objectives might be achieved. On several occasions, he has stated that former Prime Minister TOGHIDA will "soon" take a leading position in the organization, but the Embassy has learned from other sources that Mr. Tochida is not particularly interested. Mr. Shigeru YAMADA (see page 3 of the enclosed letter), a former director of the Ministry, during a recent call at the Embassy stated that he thought Mr. Higashikijiji's proposals too vague. These and other developments suggest that certain Japanese interests may be attempting to use Mr. Higashikijiji and his prestige as a front. After a recent call on Prime Minister HIRAYAMA, Mr. Higashikijiji announced that the Prime Minister fully endorsed and would support the proposed organization. A few days later, the Cabinet Secretary publicly denied the claim stating that the Prime Minister had merely expressed sympathetic interest in the objectives outlined. Earlier, after Mr. Higashikijiji had discussed his proposals with the Embassy, the Foreign Office inquired whether, as reported, the Embassy was prepared to support the proposed organization financially and otherwise. The report was, of course, firmly denied.

While the Embassy also is sympathetic with the objectives outlined by Mr. Higashikijiji, it believes that he himself has no clear idea as to how these might be achieved. For this reason, and because Mr. Higashikijiji or those who may be using him have on several occasions given misleading impressions

I am at a great loss to tell you, in the opinion of your truly, a

Organization of AMC and its Subcommittees

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Chairmen of the committee shall be entrusted to the respective countries associated through their diplomatic representations resident in Japan, and their mandates shall be given or the representatives of their own governments and leading private organizations. Number of the committees associated by each country shall be ten to twenty. Subcommittees, if any, shall be established in representative offices of the countries associated shall be created as advised.

Participation in meetings

A liaison in the whole area of Asia, in general, comes under the coverage of participation-meeting. Under the present complicated circumstances in Asia, there may be even disputes encountered in a series of getting things together on account of political, economic or ideological problems existing among Asian nations. In perspective of political unionism and from the standpoint of neighborhoodism and friendliness, the participation of as many countries as possible should be requested so as to build forth a firm tie of Asian peoples through economy and culture.

Invitations to be invited as participants/meeting: The Republic of Korea, Chinese Republic, the Philippines, Vietnam, Thailand, Malaya, Hongkong, Japan, Burma, India, Indonesia, Pakistan, Iran, Iraq, Afghanistan, Saudi Arabia, Israel, Jordan, Lebanon, Turkey and Japan.

Cooperation in conferences

Advanced nations of the world that understand Asia and are willing along Asian peoples and their future, shall widely be requested for their cooperation with ABC.

Countries to be invited as co-convening-chairman: The United States of America, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, the United Kingdom, France, Federal Republic of Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, the Netherlands, Italy, Norway, Sweden, Japan and South American countries.

Administrative functions:

1. ABC's organization sub-committee:
This sub-committee shall be formed under the guidance committee to study and decide the organization and structure of ABC.
2. Resources:
Funds to the directors shall be received from each of the participants and corresponding countries.

2. Committees:

A number of committees shall be appointed from among the members associated w/ in the case of Directors.

1. Honorary Advisors and Advisors:

A number of honorary advisors and advisors respectively shall be appointed.

2. General Meeting:

The general meeting of AGC shall consist of Directors, councillors, honorary advisors and advisors and shall function as deliberative body of AGC. The general meeting shall be held once a year.

1. Committees and Vice-Chairmen:

4 committees and three (3) vice-chairmen shall be selected from among the directors and shall preside over the general meeting.

2. The Board of Directors:

The directors shall form the board of directors which functions as executive body of AGC.

2. General Secretary and General Secretaries:

A general secretary shall be appointed and under his leadership a general committee is set up for carrying out the functions of AGC.

2. Technical Committee:

Technical committee shall be set up by experts and specialists and function as consultative body attached to General secretary.

Note: * or the committee shall be appointed by General secretary.

3. Protection of Personal Information Act:

Under the protection committee of law comes into being, the preparatory association shall have over its business to the newly-formed committee and its members. Thus, afterwards, the protection committee shall refer to the business of maintaining AGC.

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LIST OF PROJECTS PROPOSED BY AEC

Any project undertaken by AEC is officially to be carried by a government agency under the organization of the corresponding organization, but the following projects are set up as "cooperative" projects and therefore for promotion of and/or for achievement of AEC's objectives.

1. Negotiation of Japanese Government for changing of the names of economic cooperation with other nations and others.
2. Holding of the changed meeting of AEC and the government of other nations' conference on Asian economy and its development.
3. Opening of "Asian Industrialization Association".
4. Establishment of "economic development" public corporation in one of Asian countries concerned. In Japan, the establishment of "Asia Economic Development Technique Public Corporation" is proposed.
5. Establishment of the "Confederation Bank of Asia".
6. Setting up of an overall program of joint understandings and the research and study thereon.
7. Operation of joint ventures and cooperative activities.
8. Establishment of an institution of technical consultation required for negotiation of Asian countries.
9. Establishment of "Asian Industrial Standard Council".
10. Establishment of scientific centers in Asia and promotion of welfare and health activities in the area.

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
