pointment in a case in Wittenbergplats in West Berlin with an informant from the East Zone by the name of Kirwes, who had been recruited only recently. Kirwes was to bring him some material. HOEHER, on his part, wanted to learn a little more about Kirwes. Kirwes seized the opportunity when HOEHER'S attention was momentarily distracted by someincident elsewhere in the case, to pour a strong drug into HOEHER's wineglass: he then accompanied the man, immediately reeling in half-stupor, out of the case as if he were heavily drunk, made a few joking remarks to the amused guests, and pushed HOEHER into a waiting car which immediately took off to East Berlin.

The abduction of Wolfgang HOEMER had been reported in detail in February. This disclosure allowed the suspicion that the entire Wollweber campaign may be based on a few old isolated cases dug out with the purpose of producing a certain propaganda effect. The doubts grew with the realisation that HOEMER's statement concerning the alleged activities of the Gehlen Organisation in France was published just on the day when the French Mational Assembly was debating the acceptance or refusal of the European Defense Convention. The doubts grew further when experts said it was absurd to believe that a man in a subordinate position like HOEMER's should have known, in Berlin, of any act-

ivities of the Gehlen Organisation in Trance.
