At the time Steyerling ceased operations in the Balkans at Jugoslavia were operating, the furnishing of direct links to the T/T operators in General Drag Mihalositch (D.M.), the other main contact with the anti-Tito forces north of Sarajevo, operating in conjunction with an anti-Tito partisan group and therefore constantly changing its position, and a wireless operator. As regards to HOTTEL, the potential wireless contacts in Jugoslavia are considerable and increasing. Several wireless groups (H. Mihalositch) mostly with anti-Tito partisan bands, are in the process of activation but have not started calling yet. In addition there are several information agencies with units of the USIACOM, Croatia, and not too much difficulty should be encountered calling them.

To what extent it will be possible to bring agents to Albania and Macedonia by land is doubtful. Two groups, one of which is composed of at least six T/T agents all equipped with sets, are to be sent by air to Albania. HOTTEL believes that assistance from the chiefs of certain Albanian tribes will be forthcoming and that it will be possible to start organizing an information net in Albania. The T-T agents are to be sent to Macedonia. Not more than one or two sets will be sent to Macedonia. A group of agents (Sinschtrub) are to be sent to Macedonia, composed of a German agent and the leader of the T-T agents and a wireless operator.

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and laid out in icy. Neither bank nor of the corporate and flying this transaction. This method involves a relatively few risks and the only expense involved is the commission paid to the addressee.

7. GURNE is not cognizant of plans to cut the net under American control. He frequently mentioned though that in case of German defeat, which he considered inevitable, the British and Americans might be interested in a well-oiled and well-organized intelligence apparatus, citing as an indication for such of us here was obtained by the British that they had been receiving I/P reports from circles abroad as with his information net. At least this time GURNE would not be jumping the gun, but to wait until he had received the go-ahead signal.

All along GURNE maintained contact with the American and British mission, occasionally feeding them information through a middle man. One of his addressees was a certain Peter Constant, 101 St. Jean Street, Bukarest, who kept in touch with a British reporter named Gibson.

8. The friendship between GURNE and Gibson is of long standing, and GURNE believes that if ever GURNE should be falling out with him, he would find ways and means of throwing out a net for Gibson, intelligence to GURNE because of the close personal relationship. Several agents have been arrested by the Russians. In order to stay quite safe had the whole information operation checked by agents of the Intelligence II and 1st, Vienna, who also maintain a differentiation net in Rumania. (Lieutenant PIFF).

9. Prospects of expanding the net exist, but it is American resources, but its disposal, with a financial fund and a number of agents inserted) and material (I/P sets and apparatus).

The switch-over should not run into any serious difficulties with GURNE around, who is an experienced intelligence operator and who knows how to bring the various national agencies in line with the requirements of the information net.

Wireless communications can be established at any time. It is understood that in case the central transmitter should be cut off totally the Rumania transmitters will continue working for several months.

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
