SYNOPSIS OF FACTS:

The records of MCA, ... and ... reflect no information identifiable with the subject or ... Check of sources fail to identify subject. ... advised regarding subject's background.

DETAILS:

At Detroit, Michigan:

This investigation is predicated upon information received from T-1, another governmental agency which conducts security type investigations, who indicates that the subject reportedly escaped from the Czechoslovakian Republic in 1945 and is presently residing in Detroit, Michigan. T-1 stated that the subject reportedly was a member of the Communist Party in Czechoslovakia prior to 1945. T-1 further advised that the subject reportedly corresponds with his wife ... Prague-Mixev, Stalina 131, ...

The records of the Merchants Credit Bureau and two Michigan Merchants Credit Association ... checked on June 9, 10, and 14, 1954 fail to reflect any records identifiable with the subject or with ... 111 West Kirby, Detroit, Michigan, the cover name reportedly used by the subject to correspond

with his wife. The records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Detroit, Michigan, as examined on May 27, 1954 by Mrs. MORRIS, Clerk, fail to reflect any record of the subject or of the General. Mrs. MORRIS stated that it was possible that the subject had been in Detroit but had since moved in which case the Detroit office of Immigration and Naturalization Service would have no record and such a record would be located in the Central Office, Immigration and Naturalization Service, in Washington, D.C.

A check of current telephone directories, street guides, cross index directory, and city directory fail to reflect the name of the subject or of GENERAL MORRIS.

Dr. JAMES LAW, acting supervisor of casework, International Institute, 111 East Kirby, Detroit, advised the writer and JAMES MORRIS on July 28, 1954 that his records reflect that JAMES MORRIS as JAMES MORRIS arrived in New York City on December 10, 1951 on the "General Baird" as a passenger and was sponsored by Dr. JAMES LAW of the Holly Stark Sanitarium, Canton, Ohio. The records further show that JAMES MORRIS has Alien Registration Number A-8182286, resides at 4468 Mc Dougall Street, Detroit, and is employed by the United States Radiator Company, Detroit. He stated that MORRIS was born October 28, 1902 at Sadova, Poland, is married but seeking a divorce through letters, and that his wife resides in Prague, Czechoslovakia refusing to come to the USA. He stated that he regards MORRIS as being of the left-wing school of thought but as being "anti-Communist" and a member of the Social Democratic Party in Europe. He also advised that MORRIS resides with the subject and has used the address of the institute in the past.

Records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, under File No. A-8188286; reflected the following information on October 21, 1954, regarding NESTOR HOLEJKO:

Wife: EMILIE HOLEJKO, nee WERSIK
Wife's date of birth: November 16, 1909, at Krams, Czechoslovakia
Marriage: December 21, 1934, at Prague, Czechoslovakia
Children: LONGRIN HOLEJKO, born 1934, at Prague;
IRIANE HOLEJKO, born 1942, at Prague
Subject's parents: Father - JAN HOLEJKO, deceased
Mother - EMILIE HOLEJKO, nee IWASZKO, deceased

The files of the Immigration and Naturalization Service reflect a sworn signed statement furnished to G. NELSON by Subject at Salzburg, Austria, on September 14, 1951, which contains a paragraph to the effect that the Subject was never a member of the Communist Party of any country.

The Communist Party has been designated by the Attorney General of the United States pursuant to Executive Order 10450.

The records show that the Subject was admitted to the United States on December 10, 1951, at New York, New York, and filed a declaration of intention, United States District Court, Detroit, Michigan, on April 23, 1952.

T-1, another governmental agency which conducts security-type investigations, advised on April 13, 1954, that it had received information from a source, of unknown reliability,

that the Subject had been a member of the Communist Party in Czechoslovakia before or during the year 1952 and an active member of the underground organization "Boj" ("Fights"). ✓

T-1 advised that the source stated that in about 1942 five members of "Boj," including the Subject who declined to go, were called to Moscow for instructions. Later, date unknown, it was discovered that the other four (names unknown) members of "Boj" were executed in Moscow. ✓

According to T-1, the source believes that the primary reason why Subject escaped from the Czechoslovakian Republic and fled to the West was to escape apprehension by the Russians in 1945. The source also believes, according to T-1, that the HOLEJKO family is now anti-Communist.
