Subject: Herr HUBER.

According to the Adressbuch für das Deutsche in Ostasien (Shanghai, 1939) there was a Franz HUBER who was attached to the German Embassy in Tokyo in 1939, with no definition of his position or job.

In 1939, HUBER (first name not given) was reported to be a German agent in Hong Kong or in Indo-China, associated with another agent named FENKEL.

A plain-text radiogram, Tokyo to Berlin, 29 November 1944, addressed to the Reichssicherheitshauptamt, Berlin, and signed "MEISSINGER," says:

"HUBER here now (i.e., in Tokyo); requests most urgently (telephone) call."

(The German text reads:

Reichssicherheitshauptamt General Muehler oder Vertreter Prinz Albrechtstrasse  
Berlin

Huber zur Zeit hier erbittet dringendst Anruf. Heil Hitler!

MEISSINGER)

(Meissinger is, of course, Col. Josef MEISSINGER, Counsellor of Embassy, Police Attache and Chief Agent of the Gestapo in the Far East).
