HEADQUARTERS ACTION REQUIRED: None, for information and files.

1. Developments:

a. During the reporting period, two RIS messages were received by [redacted] (on 7 and 17 April), and three SW messages (Nos. 9, 10 and 11) were sent to the RIS by [redacted]. Both messages from the RIS contained significant operational data, the first informing [redacted] of a ED containing money and clothes, and the second advising [redacted] of a new temporary mailing address to be used during the period 25 May through 25 June. As reported in Attachments C and D, the ED was successfully emptied by [redacted] (after two attempts), and this was duly reported to the RIS in SW No. 10.

b. In late March (reported by [redacted] in April) [redacted] was to have met [redacted] after arrangements had been made for this meeting, but [redacted] failed to show up. Had [redacted] met with [redacted] he would have told [redacted] of his rejection of [redacted] offer of regular employment with [redacted]'s intelligence organization. [redacted] will do this at the first opportunity moment. (for details, see paragraphs 2, a. 1, Attachment A).

c. Still keeping in touch with [redacted] associate, Anton GRABER, [redacted] accepted GRABER's invitation to be a guest speaker at a YMCA function held near Stuttgart on 21 April 1956. (See paragraph 1 d, Attachment F, and paragraph 1 f, Attachment F).

d. [redacted] made an on the spot interview with several BANZERA personalities regarding the "bombing" at Kappellstrasse 57 which was apparently an attempt on Danyle GALKIVICH's life. For details of [redacted] findings have, see Attachment E. This information, incidentally, was reported to the RIS by [redacted] in his SW No. 11.

e. On instructions from the RIS to determine the motives behind the GUNMEINER group in forcing the Committee to commemorate the

OPERATIONAL MATTERS AND PERSONNEL, DODGATE REPORT #04

1. After rehearsing how the dead drop was emptied on 15 April, [ ] and [ ] turned to the matter of writing SW No. 10. After SW No. 10 was written (Galic mailed it about a half hour after the meeting ended), other operational business was taken up which was in the form of [ ] reporting what he has done recently, the people he had met and what he expected to be doing between this and the next meeting. This went as follows:

a) AECAPLEN said over the Easter holidays he had chance to meet with quite a few personalities socially, many of whom have been of interest to the SIS. Among these were Volodymyr BOLENKO, Yakov MAKOVETSKYY, Osyp BOYDUNYK, Makarii MARTENS, ASAPULHA, AECAPLEN/1, Volodymyr STAKHIV and a score of lesser personalities. His meeting with [ ], reported in SW No. 10, was confined to exchanging Easter greetings and promises to phone. Also as reported in SW No. 10, [ ] learned about Taras HULBA's expected arrival in Germany from America from BOLENKO and was able to furnish the SIS with negative information about the alleged "special school in Holland" from his talks with BOLENKO and MAKOVETSKYY.

b) When Galic remarked that he had noticed Ivan SALIYAK (DOB 14 July 1921; POB Chodorov, Poland) taking pictures in front of the Ukrainian church on Easter morning, and asked [ ] whether he thought SALIYAK was doing this on assignment. [ ] replied that SALIYAK was probably doing this for himself as a hobby and was probably not selling pictures to some intelligence agency. [ ] said he once talked about this with SALIYAK and learned from him that the Ukrainian people have accused SALIYAK of working for some unknown intelligence organization. SALIYAK further told him that several weeks ago AECAPLEN/1 had approached him with an offer to buy some of his photographs of Ukrainian personalities but that he refused to sell to AECAPLEN/1 because he was sure AECAPLEN/1 was making his bid on behalf of German intelligence who either wanted the pictures for operational reasons or who were trying to determine whether he was engaged in clandestine activity. SALIYAK said he intended to probe deeper in finding out or proving that AECAPLEN/1 is employed by the SIS.

c) [ ] said Georgi ROUDAROFF (no DOB, POB available) had been visiting RADIO FREE EUROPE (Bulgarian section) during the past week (6 - 12 April) apparently for the purpose of getting a job, and that he was supposed to return to Valka/Zirndorf on 17 April. Because he had met ROUDAROFF in Valka earlier, ROUDAROFF first approached [ ] who then introduced him to others.

d) [ ] said he was invited by Anton GRABER (26 February 1905; POB Graberje, Yugoslavia) to speak in Stuttgart on 21 April at a YMCA convention. He said he reported this to his chief [ ] who advised him to go since this would tend to increase his rapport with the Germans and perhaps give him a lead to something of interest to [ ].

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
