
1. [] phoned earlier in the day and asked to be met for a few minutes near his home so that he could pass the information given below.

a. Dr. Grzegorz ZUKOWSKI. On 4 April ZUKOWSKI arrived in Munich from Vienna with his fiancée Renislawa SAWCZUK and expects to leave for Frankfurt on 9 April. He called [] to arrange for [] to interview SAWCZUK for TPFELING on either 8 or 9 April. SAWCZUK came to Vienna from Warsaw about a month ago and was granted asylum by the Austrians and given an Austrian "Reisedocument." She claims that to get a passport to visit Austria, she paid a lawyer by the name of Pnu KOZYRA 50,000 zloty to bribe one of his contacts in the passport bureau. She further claims that in the process of getting a passport, KOZYRA arranged to have the derogatory materi. in her Warsaw file burned.

b. Pnu GLAGE. In the morning of 31 March [] was summoned by the receptionist at TPFELING to speak with a German national by the name of GLAGE who had just arrived from the East Zone and had requested to speak with someone from TPFELING. GLAGE, it seems, had just been released from prison in Dresden where he had occupied a cell by himself. Through prison commo (pounding on the wall to communicate with his next door cell mate) he learned that an Englishman by the name of Robert CAMBELL, age 32, occupied the adjoining cell. CAMBELL asked that when GLAGE is freed he should inform either TPFELING or the English consulate in Munich about his, CAMBELL's detention in Dresden for espionage.

c. As a late returnee from the Soviet Union, where he had been a PW, GLAGE, although he lived in the East Zone, was in correspondence with the West German organization Kampfgruppe gegen Unmenschlichkeit. It was for this association that he was imprisoned for three months. He was apparently recruited by the East German intelligence service while in prison, for when he was released (the release probably based on the recruitment) he was instructed to flee to the West, get established and then to write to the following address: Ernst POWELS, Berlin N 58, Rheinsbergerstrasse 40.

2. When [] concluded his brief talk with GLAGE, in fact, while it was still in progress, he told GLAGE that TPFELING was in no position to help him and therefore he should go to the German police with his story. GLAGE intimated that he would probably do this. After he left, [] reported the conversation and the facts to []. (Note: The case officer spoke with [] the following day about this and it was agreed that [] should report GLAGE's story to the LfV, but with a caution that if they intended to do something operationally about it, they should bear in mind that GLAGE probably spread his story around thus reducing the effectiveness of any play. Since [] did not identify himself to GLAGE, he will not be identified as being the person from TPFELING who spoke with GLAGE.)



OPERATIONAL MATTERS AND COMMENTS:

No. 187

1. The first order of business was to show [] the OWVL received on 11 April. [] considered the message to be quite favorable, especially since the RIS had sent him greetings from his relatives. Commenting about the proposed May meeting in Switzerland, [] said he preferred to meet in Austria rather than in Switzerland for security reasons, and because it is easier for him to get an Austrian visa and it would not take as much time travelling to and from the meeting site. This was spelled out in the SW (No. 3) which was written during this meeting.

2. Operational reporting by [] was included in SW No. 3 and dealt almost exclusively with the UMRada and the problem Mikola LIVITSKIY was having holding this organization together. (See EGMA-48535, 15 Apr 60 for details of SW No. 3).

3. Since [] had accumulated more information than there was room for in SW No. 3, to say nothing of data on the personalities mentioned in the OWVL of 11 April, it was decided to write another letter on 15 April to bring his reporting up to date.

4. The CO asked [] about his interview with Remislaw SAWCZUK (Gregorz ZUKOWSKI's fiancée), which took place several days ago. [] said this interview produced very little for TPFEEELING since all SAWCZUK wanted to talk about was her beauty parlor in Warsaw and other uninteresting topics.

5. The next meeting was scheduled for 15 April.

OPERATIONAL MATTERS AND COMMENTS:

1. At 1000 hours on 16 April [] called and requested an urgent meeting. In [] temporary absence, [] met [] The latter at first apologized for requesting a meeting on Easter Saturday, but he added that he thought this matter should be reported to the AIS at once.

[] reported the following: AEDOGMA called him on the evening before and among other things stated that he was desperately ill with an unknown skin disease. He has been in terrible pain, and several doctors whom he had consulted are unable to help him. He suspects that this disease was caused by an unknown poison administered by the RIS. The person he suspects having possibly administered this poison is a young Ukrainian girl, Tamara HRYCIUK, residing in Paris. This girl is alleged to be one of the leading elements of a Ukrainian youth group, a nationalist emigre group, in Paris. This girl also represented the anti-Communist emigres from Paris during the Vienna Youth Festival. She was alleged to have been distributing anti Communist propaganda in a Vienna book store. The reason he suspects that this girl might have been instrumental in causing his disease is, firstly, her father is a communist in France. Secondly, he had a rendez vous with her three days prior to his skin breaking out in Paris. When Tamara did not appear at the pre-designated time and place at the rendez vous, AEDOGMA went to a restaurant circa a block from the RV site, when after some 45 minutes Tamara walked in. They drank some coffee and also wine. AEDOGMA recalls that prior to his departure from the restaurant, he went into the cloak room to fetch his coat. As he approached Tamara upon returning from the cloak room she was looking out the window and gazing at someone. She appeared to be startled seeing AEDOGMA returning so soon and she stated in a rather stuttering manner that the young man out there is an acquaintance of hers from the Soviet Embassy in Paris. Circa three to four days after the meeting with Tamara, AEDOGMA became ill.

3. After listening to the above account, [] stated that this is certainly a matter which will have to be reported to the RIS. He did not feel, however, the urgency of reporting it to the RIS. However, since [] just wrote an SW letter on 15 April, this matter can wait until the end of the week. (Comment: Since [] has been in contact with AEDOGMA in Munich, this entire affair is being coordinated with him.)

4. [] presented us with two Ukrainian salamis. He requested that one be given to [] and the other enjoyed by [] We thanked him for his thoughtfulness and the meeting was terminated.

OPERATIONAL MATTERS AND COMMENTS NO. 188

1. At this meeting, [] was introduced to [] as [] associate. Although it was not specified that [] would take over the case, or that Gallo was pulling out, it was made quite obvious that [] was connected with the case. This was sufficient for his meeting. It is expected that in the near future, [] and [] will assume complete responsibility for running [] [] spoke in German, a language which both handle fluently.

2. SW No. 4 was written during this meeting, and the letter mailed shortly after the meeting ended. The entire text of the message was devoted to a report on Yuriy STUDYNSKY, as asked for by the RIS in their message of 11 April.

3. [] reported he learned from Ivan SALLYAK that AEDOGMA I had returned from France for the Easter holidays, and that he, [], had confirmed this by a telephone call to AEDOGMA I. He said in making the call, he merely dialed and when the male voice on the other end answered, he then put down the receiver without saying a word. He said he expected AEDOGMA-I to phone him before the end of the day, and that perhaps they would see each other over the holidays.

4. It was agreed that the next meeting would be held during the last week in April unless an RIS message was received on 18 April and required immediate handling.

OPERATIONAL MATTERS AND COMMENTS:

1. [] was met on 26 April 1960 for the purposes of (a) showing him the OWVL message of 24 April, (b) writing an SW letter to the RIS and (c) hearing whatever news [] had found since the last meeting.
2. [] read the OWVL message with interest. His main comment was that the RIS had acknowledged the SW #4 and ignored #3, which deals with the problem of where the next meeting with the RIS is to be, Switzerland or Austria. [] stated that he could not possibly go on vacation until June 20. He suggested that he mention his vacation plans to the RIS in SW 5. This suggestion was vetoed on the grounds that no further comment to the RIS on the next meeting was required.
3. [] was very voluble on the subject of OBERLAENDER and the trial which the East Germans now have running against him. According to [] the whole OBERLAENDER affair is aimed at discrediting the Ukrainian resistance fighters, past and present. The objective of the whole exercise is to show that the OUN and UPA were but the running dogs of the Nazis. [] is willing to admit that the affair also has some political capital for the East Germans. [] also told various stories from his experiences with the Nazis aimed at showing that, so far as Ukrainian policy was concerned, the various Nazi government elements never knew what each other was doing in the Ukrainian. []
4. A second new item was a PP harassment letter aimed at embarrassing the Bund der Freiheit. [] got the letter from AEDOGMA 1. It is dated 14 April 1960 and requests the presence of the addressee at a meeting which will discuss the theme of "The Cooperation of the German and Ukrainian Peoples in the Freeing of the Ukrainian from Bolschewism". It is further stated in the letter that Theodor OBERLAENDER will also speak. According to [] and others soon discovered that the letter was a blatant provocation. [] is supposed to have gone immediately to the Munich police with the matter. Then all the Bund der Freiheit members were called and informed of the true facts in the case.
5. [] learned from V. STAKHIV that Mikola LIVITSKY, who is visiting USA, has been talking to Melnyk people and AECASSOWARY-2 in an effort to shore up his failing position within UNRADA.
6. The SW 5 was written. It contained the following items.
 - a. The complete story of the harassment letter was given.
 - b. The bare bones of the AEDOGMA-1 sickness was given. This matter was reported on to [] on 16 April 1960. In addition, the whole affair of AEDOGMA-1's probable brush with some kind of poison has been reported by [] In the SW message [] merely stated that AEDOGMA-1 is very sick and described his symptoms. Although [] knows almost the whole story of the case from AEDOGMA-1, no further details were reported to the RIS.

c. The Levitsky story as outlined above was reported.

d. In reply to the latest RIS OWVL, [] wrote in the letter that he has not heard of any Ukrainian nationalist preparations for either the Paris meeting or the Austrian visit of KHRUSHCHEV.

e. Normal May Day greetings were included.

7. [] was sincerely worried about AEDOGMA-1. [] is unhappily aware that he has reported on AEDOGMA-1 to the RIS and feels responsible at least in part for the present unpleasant state of AEDOGMA-1. He was consoled with the advice that (a) AEDOGMA-1 is a very well known personality to the RIS from many sources other than [] (b) the circumstances of AEDOGMA-1's probably being poisoned as related by [] show a notable disregard on AEDOGMA-1's part for the basic rules of an intelligence personality's dealing with an unknown source. [] then remembered that he had never told the RIS of AEDOGMA-1's Paris address. He went away feeling better about the matter but still with a somewhat uneasy feeling about the whole thing.

8. At about 2145 the meeting was adjourned. At about 200 the SW letter was mailed at the Galeriestrasse postoffice in Munich.
