10. FACTS, EVALUATION AND COMMENT: (Use additional plain sheet if necessary)

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a. LCBROWL

During the reporting period, membership in the Bund Deutscher Jugend (League of German Youth) (BDJ) increased by 305 bringing the total to 8,773. Fifteen new local offices were opened in West Germany.

The BDJ continued its role as a militant anti-communist organization, but at the same time initiated positive action in other spheres. Emphasis was placed on countering the unity proposals of Grotewohl and the East German government. In a clever tactical move the leader of the FDJ was provoked into refusing an invitation to meet with BDJ members in Stuttgart. The terms of the letter of refusal were abusive and insulting, thus exposing the insincerity of the unity drive.

In cooperation with other German Democratic youth groups the BDJ was represented in a German youth delegation which traveled to Paris to present a petition to the UN protesting the warlike activities of the FDJ. This fact was given due attention in the German press. The fact that 31 FDJ officials are standing trial in East Germany for "crimes in connection with the world youth festival" (the last Berlin Youth Rally) has been brought to light by the BDJ and has likewise received considerable press attention.

In Hamburg the BDJ led an active campaign against a Communist inspired dock strike while in Bremen the local organization disrupted a meeting of a communist front organization. In Hanover the BDJ held 15 successful rallies in addition to breaking up a gathering where Pastor Niemoller was the speaker. The Frankfurt branch of the BDJ reported cooperation with Socialist youth groups in disrupting Communist meetings. The Berlin branch continued a concentrated program of anti-Communist activity, including meetings, distribution of leaflets, and balloon actions. In a street encounter with an FDJ gang a member of the Berlin BDJ branch was killed. Cooperation with the major political parties was further developed, particularly in Francoforte.

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Two classes for instructors and one for speakers were conducted at the political school in Leutich. These classes were attended by local, group, and county leaders.

Some 292,000 anti-Communist propaganda items were produced and distributed throughout Germany during the reporting period. Of these, 10,000 items were distributed in West Germany. Information Service, the official monthly publication of the NSD, appeared with a lead article demanding honest all-German youth conferences. During the same period the forest and content was approved in a poll of the membership. Some 110,000 letters, dealing with such subjects as Wehrmacht's official reaction to the U.S. disarmament proposal and the failure of the FDJ to enter into all-German youth talks were distributed throughout East and West Germany. Bolshevism as the underlying negative force in the Soviet zone and contemporary problems of the East zone youth were discussed in 60,000 pamphlets distributed in East Germany.

Internal culture sections of NSD units are actively contributing to the pool-itive character of the organization through a variety of cultural and service projects. Arranging Christmas packages for German boys and the needy in the East zone, collecting contributions for the German Olympic Team, and conducting national programs fall into this category.

LCRIB, however, major efforts during the reporting period were concentrated on tightening the control and security of the apparatus. New control arrangements were made in order to increase compartmentalization. No changes in the leadership were effected. Apparent records now contain 53 completed questionnaires. In East Germany, existing contacts were expanded and preparations to win toward active resistance initiated. Those included establishment of additional border crossing points and recruitment of members in key target areas.

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b. ICPROWL: The record of the BDJ in terms of output and effort continues to be impressive and the death of a Berlin member in the course of this activity attests to the sincerity of the members of the organization. Efforts by the BDJ to conduct service and cultural activities seem especially welcome from the standpoint of cover as well as winning the acceptance of the BDJ by West German democratic groups.

ICPROWL Apparat: This project is now in a state of transition with the future status of the western portion of the organization liable to some revision. It is expected that the Apparat will continue to play a very active role in East Germany, but that it will take the form of a carefully selected nucleus for resistance activities in West Germany

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
