Project LCPROWL established an OPC subsidy to the Bund Deutscher Jugend (League of German Youth), a nation-wide, Western-oriented youth organization in the Federal Republic of Germany. This project was to be implemented in four phases: (1) the utilization of the League during the October 15, 1950 general elections in the Soviet Zone of Germany; (2) consolidating the League as a permanent nation-wide organization; (3) employing the League in political warfare operations; (4) guerrilla warfare, sabotage and general resistance training of selected League members. Phase One (with a budget of \$ - OPC and \$ - ZRCANDY) was approved on 9 August 1950. On 29 August the implementation of Phase Four was approved. No additional budget allotment was requested at that time, since expenditures were expected to be negligible in the initial stages.

Project Amendment No. 1, approved 21 December 1950, authorized implementation of Phases Two and Three of this project with a ZRCANDY budget allotment of DM - I for 15 months beginning 1 January 1951. At the same time an initial FY 1951 budget allotment of \$ - I Phase Four was made. It was stipulated that this latter amount would be revised upward if found necessary at a later date, and under this proviso an additional sum of \$ - I OPC funds was allocated and expended for the procurement and shipment of training equipment and preparation for the establishment of a permanent training site.

3. Amendment Proposal:

In order to make possible the immediate training of selected members of the Bund Deutscher Jugend in paramilitary operations, it is proposed to authorize the implementation of Phase Four of subject project (LCPROWL Apparat) on a permanent basis with a budget of \$L \ \mathrmaleq \text{OPC funds to} cover organizational, training and operational costs for thirteen months beginning 1 June 1951.

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4. Discussion:

a. Mission

- (1) Rapidly expanding U. S. military commitments in Western Europe make it essential that German manpower be drawn upon to provide a source of reliable resistance, guerrilla and sabotage personnel for the pre- and post-D-Day requirements of the NATO forces. In the absence of an organized pro-Western German military establishment, either overt or clandestine, it has devolved upon OPC to take the initiative in recruiting, training, indoctrinating, supplying and maintaining a German paramilitary resistance network. The LCPROWL Apparat provides the most practical mechanism available to OPC for this program.
- (2) Before D-Day it will be the mission of the Apparat to train its members in tactics, communications, sabotage methods and increase their knowledge of the terrain in their areas. As a secondary mission, the Apparat will be organized to cope with attempts on the part of unfriendly elements and hostile organizations to penetrate the organization.
- (3) It is planned to organize 7,000 members of the BDJ for the above purposes. On D-Day and immediately following, approximately 3,000 of these will engage in retardation activities; the remaining 4,000 will be organized into small units for general resistance activities or will assemble in previously designated mountain areas which will serve as bases for guerrilla operations.
- (4) After D-Day and during the subsequent Soviet occupation, active resistance of the Apparat will be coordinated with the strategic operations of the U. S. military forces. Apparat operations will include raids, ambushes, sabotage, psychological warfare and other activities of a resistance nature.

b. Organization of the Apparat

(1) West Germany. The Apparat will be divided into two main parts; the fighting force and the sabotage group, both responsible to the command section consisting of the chief and assistant chief of the organization. The sabotage group will consist of approximately 50 men whose mission it will be to train industrial, transportation, communications workers, etc., in sabotage techniques. The fighting force will be organized under nine Land leaders; each of the Land units will be broken down into Kreis districts. There will be a total of 530 Kreis units. Each Kreis leader will have a ten-man unit under his command, whose post-D-Day mission will be to raid and destroy supply depots, communications, troop encampments, and in general to lower the morale and hinder the fighting efficiency of the Soviet occupying authorities. Technical services are to be the responsibility of a support group or Dienst.

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- (2) <u>East Germany</u>. The sub-divisions of the Apparat will be the same as in West Germany, only on a smaller scale. For example, the fighting force in East Germany will consist of 5 Land leaders and 178 Kreis units.
- (3) <u>Communications</u>. Communications will normally be handled by a courier network, supplemented by a radio net (Attachment to tab B). A communications annex will be prepared in coordination with the CIA Communications Board to cover contact between an outside station and the "radio central." Communications on the lower echelons will be worked out by the members of the Apparat themselves under the guidance of the net control man.

c. Training

- (1) Leaders of the Apparat down to the Kreis level will be trained by an OPC team of staff agents in a private training area and in secure sections of U. S. military training areas within Western Germany. The training period will cover 14 days and will include such subjects as security, communications, map reading, small arms and demolitions, and other courses necessary for paramilitary training. In addition, political orientation and indoctrination courses in keeping with the mission of the Apparat will be interspersed throughout the training period.
- (2) The command section of the Apparat and all West German Land leaders will be trained initially. The next group will consist of the Kreis leaders (15 at a time) who will then return to their respective Kreis areas and begin, under the guidance of their Land leaders, a basic indoctrination and training of the men they have recruited. Each Kreis leader will be trained in the tactics dictated by the terrain and communications in his area. As a security factor Kreis leaders of the same Land will not know each other and will not be placed in the same class during the OPC-conducted training courses.
- (3) As soon as feasible, special attention will be given to recruiting, training, and assignment of Apparat members in the Soviet Zone.


d. Cover

The leading members of the Apparat will ostensibly be employed by a firm manufacturing a new type of gramophone record. Letters from all parts of the world indicate interest in this type of new (flexible) record, and it is believed that it will be a worthwhile enterprise financially, as well as providing cover for the project. In addition, other commercial covers will be established for the key personnel of the Apparat.

Other members of the Apparat will continue to pursue their normal activities until their services are required.

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e. Budget

5. Conclusions:

In view of the outstanding performance record of the BDJ in the field of psychological warfare, there is good reason to believe that the activities contemplated for the Apparat will make a positive contribution to OPC's paramilitary resistance program.

6. Recommendations:

It is recommended that the Project Review Board approve this amendment as contained in the proposal paragraph 3 above.

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
