**SUBJECT: Michal GOLENIEWSKI and
wife, Irmgard Margarete
(nee KAMPF)**

Pursuant to the authority granted under Section 7 of the Central Intelligence Agency Act of 1949, as amended, I approve and recommend for your concurrence the entry of the subjects into the United States for permanent residence since their admission is in the interest of national security and essential to the furtherance of the national intelligence mission. In accordance with previous Section 7 cases, it is understood that you will present this matter to the Attorney General for his concurrence.

Michal GOLENIEWSKI has made extremely valuable contributions to national security since April 1958, and it is expected that he will continue to be of valuable service to this Agency. Investigations made abroad and in the United States, including national agency checks, have established the subjects' bona fides.

In this case I would like to bring to your attention the matter of GOLENIEWSKI's divorce which he states was accomplished in 1957. The Agency has interrogated GOLENIEWSKI intensively on this point. He has supplied a tremendous amount of detail on this subject since he reports that the factual situation concerning his wife and the impending divorce action resulted in official cognizance of the matter by his superiors in the Polish Intelligence Service.

EXEMPTIVE DECLASSIFIED FILE

was required to furnish all information available to him about his wife and, in addition, she was interrogated by his superiors. By virtue of the official interest of his Service, the proceedings were not open to the public and the testimony relating to the wife's mental condition was retained by the Polish Intelligence Service as was the final court decree. Under the circumstances of this case, we have determined that it would be futile to make any attempt to secure documentary proof of the divorce.

Based on all the information available to me, it is my belief that there is no question in law as to the validity of his current marriage. Therefore, it is hoped there will be no difficulty in your processing the case simply because it is impossible to secure official copies of his Polish divorce decree. I am anxious that appropriate adjustment of legal status be made in view of the significant contribution G. COLINIEWSKI has made in the furtherance of the national intelligence mission. Not only did he supply vast amounts of detailed information and documents upon arrival in the United States but for over two years, prior to his defection, he supplied information and documents of vital importance to this country. His services have materially aided this Agency and he has rendered valuable assistance to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. If there are any questions, please let us know so that we may consult with you in an attempt to resolve such questions or, if needed, supply you with additional information.

MEMORANDUM FOR: THE DIRECTOR

Attached is a revised letter for your signature to General Swing concerning an adjustment of status of GOLENIEWSKI and his wife under Section 7 of P. L. 110. Alien Affairs has advised there is strong likelihood that I & N will question the case because of lack of proof of the Polish divorce. We believe it most inappropriate to require a second divorce in the U. S. and subsequent remarriage to his current wife. Based on the facts, as we know them, the marriage is considered valid with abundant case law support including at least one Immigration case.
