The following are excerpts from the July 29, 1972 briefing.

Colonel Carlson:

Enemy gunners shelled friendly forces in the

vicinity of Fire Support Base Bastogne.

Dr. Kissinger:

Then it has not been retaken.

Colonel Carlson:

No, it has not been retaken yet.

* * * *

Dr. Kissinger:

Didn't they move a division over there from the

Kontum area (referring to Binh Dinh area)

Colonel Carlson:

We did move some elements into the area south of

DaNang.

Dr. Kissinger:

I mean enemy elements.

Col. Carlson:

Yes, you are correct. One unit of the NVA 2nd

Division shifted over from Kontum.

* * * *

Dr. Kissinger:

Is the road into AnLoc open?

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Well they are still working on it; there is no Colonel Carlson:

traffic moving.

That's a pretty good definition of being closed. Dr. Kissinger:

They are still removing mines and repairing Colonel Carlson:

the road.

Dr. Kissinger: But theoretically there are no enemy units

interdicting the road.

We have had reports of Jeep traffic but there have General Haig:

been no convoys because of the mines.

* * * *

What is the total number of enemy killed thus far? Dr. Kissinger:

(Pauses while looking it up) Colonel Carlson:

Commander Howe: I believe I saw an estimate of around 72,000.

There have been 70,802 killed. Here it is. Colonel Carlson:

And that means at least the same number have Dr. Kissinger:

> been wounded. It's hard to believe the total is that high. What do you think the actual number

of dead is?

Colonel Carlson: When you consider the amount of Tac Air and

B-52's it seems reasonable.

But they only started with 150,000 and you are Dr. Kissinger:

saying they have had at least 140,000 casualties.

That's true, but they have brought down a large Colonel Carlson:

number of replacements as well as two more

divisions.

What is the maximum number of B-52's that Dr. Kissinger:

can be flown if we need to? Can you surge these?

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Colonel Carlson: Yes. We can obtain a higher number with the

assets available but not for a sustained period.

Dr. Kissinger: Of course.

* * * *

Dr. Kissinger: Why is the number of tactical air strikes against

the North so low?

Colonel Carlson: There was bad weather in the lower portion. The

effort in the Panhandle was seriously restricted

by weather.

Dr. Kissinger: But why not divert the Panhandle planes to the

area further north?

Colonel Carlson: I'll check and find out.

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
