MEMORANDUM OF CONVERSATION

Joint Staff

DATE:

November 16, 1972

PARTICIPANTS:

Colonel Carlson Colonel West Dr. Kissinger General Haig

Commander Howe

Colonel Carlson:

The outlook for the next several days is for generally low clouds and poor weather from 14 to 20 degrees north with a frontal system in the

area.

Dr. Kissinger:

Does the weather affect the B-52s?

Colonel Carlson:

No, they can do it on instruments and using

LORAN bombing techniques.

Dr. Kissinger:

Does 14 to 20 degrees cover the whole South?

Colonel Carlson:

Pretty near. It extends down over MR-1 and

MR-2. It will probably last for two or three days.

Dr. Kissinger:

That means three weeks. What is the problem?

Are we running low on new ordnance?

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Dr. Kissinger:

Where is the 21st Division?

Colonel Carlson:

(Using map, indicates the locations in south

western MR-4.)

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Dr. Kissinger: Their commander wants to sign a ceasefire.

Colonel Carlson: There have been a number of contacts involving

the 21st Division recently.

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Dr. Kissinger: (Observing pattern of B-52 sorties in South Viet-

nam) It appears that all the strikes have been

south of Vinh.

Colonel Carlson: Yes, but tomorrow they are programmed further

north.

Dr. Kissinger: What are they hitting - airfields?

Colonel Carlson: No.

Dr. Kissinger: Are all the B-52 strikes under the control of

General Weyand? Who picks the targets?

Colonel Carlson: I don't know. I will call back. I am pretty sure

General Weyand is taking care of Route Package One, but I will have to check on Route Packages

Two and Three.

[Colonel Carlson called back with the following reply: "CINCPACAF in coordination with CINCPACFLT and MACV in conjunction-with

the Air Coordination Group in Saigon. "]

Dr. Kissinger: Why don't they hit the pass areas.

General Haigs. The enemy is moving most of their stuff through

the DMZ.

Colonel Carloon: B-52s and tacair hit fairly heavy in the area

last night.

Colonel Carlson: The 224 anti-aircraft regiment has moved from

South Vietnam into North Vietnam.

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General Hair: Does that make four that has moved north now?

Colonel Carlson: Yes.
