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DOD has established an advisory committee of outside consultants to recommend policy guidelines on which U.S. technology can and cannot be exported to Communist countries without serious security risk. To begin with, they will focus on aircraft and engines, semiconductor devices, computers, and instrumentation.

The experts are drawn from the relevant industries. They will supplement the in-house effort within BDR&E, ISA, and the DOD Labs to deal with the difficult question of the military significance of technology exports. However, one problem with using industrial advice has already surfaced: Fairchild Semiconductor claims their export request to Poland was disapproved based on guidelines and advice fed to DOD by its competitor, Texas Instruments (TI). They say, further, that TI's Vice President, Fred Bucy, who heads the DOD advisory committee, has been cultivating business in Eastern Europe (including Poland) and the whole deal looks unhealthy.

Beyond general considerations, the reason for keeping you informed of these matters is that the Jackson Amendments to the 1975 Military Authorization Act and the Export Administration Act vests substantial new responsibilities regarding technology trade with Communist countries in the hands of the Secretary of Defense. As the tempo of this trade increases, there certainly are going to be cases of disagreement between DOD, Commerce, and State which we will have to adjudicate adroitly, otherwise Congress will exercise its new authority and make specific decisions on individual cases.
