1. Subject was issued reentry permit File No. A-8351913
on 29 Sept. 1954
19 54 by the Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization. The permit expires on 29 Sept. 1955
19 55.
Subject must present himself at a United States port of entry on or before the expiration of the permit. Otherwise, subject can enter only if in possession of a visa.

- 2. The validity of this permit may be extended for a maximum period of one #1) year from the above expiration date. If it is required that he remain abroad for a longer time, the Alien Affairs Staff should be consulted as to the possibility of other arrangements.
- 3. It should be noted that, if the alien is to remain outside the United States for more than one (1) year, your office should consult with the Alien Affairs Staff to obtain the benefits of Section 316(b) of the Immigration and Nationality Act which permits an alien employed by the Government to count the time spent abroad toward his residence requirements for naturalization. It is pointed out that an application for these benefits should be submitted to this office prior to the alien's departure.

## PROCEDURES for EXTENSION of PERMITS

4. Subject should execute an application for extending this reentry permit before an American Consul abroad. The Consul is not med with the statements in the application; he acts merely as a Notary Fublic, verifying the signature of the applicant. The application must be executed and sworn to before the Consular Officer FRIOR TO THE EXPIRATION DATE. There is no exception to this requirement. If the alien is operating under cover, and security factors preclude revelation of his Government connection, the Alien Affairs Staff should be consulted. Application forms for extension are generally available at American Consulates abroad. If such forms are unavailable, an application may be drawn up. The following points should be included:

- 5. Your field representative should transmit to Headquarters: the permit, the completed application for extension, and an international money order in the amount of ten dollars (\$10.00), payable to the Treasurer of the United States. If you prefer, your office may purchase a postal money order in this country. Cash or checks will not be accepted.
- 6. The permit, application, and money order should be delivered to the Alien Affairs Staff with a memorandum, signed by a Branch Chief, requesting this office to take appropriate action for extension of the permit. When the extension is secured, the permit will be returned to your office for transmittal to the field and delivery to the alien.
- 7. Your field representative should take timely action so that the permit can be delivered to the Immigration and Naturalization Service for extension prior to its expiration date.
- 8. All reentry permits, which are issued but not utilized, must be returned to the Alien Affairs Staff for disposition. This will protect the alien's immigration status and will avoid security hazards.
- 9. In any case where the alien possesses documents in a name different than on the reentry permit, it is pointed out that the alien may encounter grave difficulties if immigration authorities or other governmental officials learn that he has such documents. This is especially true when the alien applies for reentry to the United States.
