REFERENCE: 25 April 1950 Agende on Outstanding Lesues of Operations BOFIERD-AESTAIR

2. All points on reference agends were covered generally in the erder outlined. All the significant developments and desisions are summarised below, including designations of offices responsible for continuing action.

b. The procurement of aut-outs to ______ main agents abroad is under consideration at the present time by PB-I.

2. M Program

a. Shortwave broadcosts and leaflet drops

(1) stated that the first mobile station to go on the air will be the one for broadcasts to the peasants. He also pointed out that the name of a flatitious organization as sponsor of the broadcasts was not desirable, since eventually the Hulgarians will want some concrete proof of the existence of the ergenisation. It was generally agreed that the sponsor should have some connection with the peasant movement, that the station should be presented as an action arm of some larger organimation, and that exact identification with the HGPE or the



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Balgarian National Committee would lead to unnecessary complications vis a vis ______ It was therefore desided tentatively to use a name such as "Action Arm of the Committee for a Free Bulgaria". This name will not be the same as the existing Balgarian Committee, but it will be close enough for Bulgarians to make the necessary inforence.

In respect to the station which will breadcast the national communist line, the name "Kadio Station Traishe Koster" was suggested and approved. We attempt was made to the this station in with an existing organization. If necessary this can be done at a later date.

(2) It was quickly agreed that the initial leaflets for GENTAIR should be prepared in the same name as the breadcasts by the radie station for the presents. After considerable discussion it was likewise agreed that the first leaflet drop should be made subsequent to the first breadcasts in order to avoid telegraphing our punches. (auggested that the problem of attracting the attention of the Bulgarian listening and/once can easily be solved by putting our mobile stations on a frequency close to that of popular Bulgarian radio programs.

(3) In respect to the printing of these leaflets, it was desided that this should be done at first in the United States where facilities are available. Since this has been done in the past for other countries, there is no reason why it can not be done now for Sulgaria. Then feasible, the printing may be shifted to Grosse. () agreed to look into the technical problems of doing this, particularly that of scheduling the printing.

As in the writing of the leaflets, general agreement was reached that the best may would be to have a capable Bulgarian do this, instead of having PR-II prepare the material in English and then have it translated.

411 approved a tentetive figure of 500,000 as the number of leaflets to be printed initially. Newsver, will make further recommendations on this, if Recommeny, from the field. It was agreed that the first drops should be from abutes and not by book because it was felt that this kind of drop would be more convincing.

(6) The whole problem of procurement of the mobile transmitters for the elandestine broadcasts into Bulgaria was brought up and considerable dissetisfaction was expressed with the rate of progress. It was decided that the



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following stops will be taken to expedite the matter.

(a) An attempt will be made to establish top priority for procurement of this broadensting equipment through ORT facilities./ will immediately submit requirements on this material, including specifleations not only on the most desirable equipment but also on alternative excisment which would be adequate for the jeb. (will then write a mano to 2050 for OPETs signature requesting that top priority among all OFC projects be given by 080 to the procurenent and assembling of this equipment for TSTAIR. As a result of this meno a direct channel will be established betreen/ lof OSC and and OSO will be able to give a 'realistic' estimate or how long it will take to get the evalpment ready for shipmont.

(b) If this top priority eagnet be established, or if the 050 'realistic' estimate involves too long a time for presering the equipment, then will explore the possibility of procuring satisfactory equipment more salakly through the dray Signel Corps or the Navy. All agreed that the only satisfactory and speedy way to work through the dray or Havy would be by high level context with the appropriate office of the Department of Defense. It was generally fult that there is some liklihood that adequate equipment might be svailsble in whole or in part in Greece at present, but that no attempt will be made to go into this until 050 has some up with its estimate.

c. General sgreement was reached that it would be an excallent idea for VOR, when the time comes, to announce that its monitors have picked up a new whort wave station in Bulgaria. FB-II and FD-1 will explore how VOR's seoperation has been secured in the past.

d. It was agreed that research will be undertaken on the

a. For the next for months a decision of an overt bolding ares for Bulgarians will be hald in aboyance, as no one thought that it would be necessary to procure such an eres for the solection and training of the initial agents to be sent into Dulgaria. It was agreed that small safe houses in Greece will. be sufficient in the first stages of the operation. saw no reason why such houses could not be readily procured, and stated that his main problem would be getting a good Bulgarian to aid him in recruiting agents.

raised the problem of getting agents into b./ Groups from other equatries, such as France. No solution was it suggested that an evert holding area reached./ would give justification for the assessment of Bulgarians into Greece. It was suggested that U. S. passports might be used, but it was pointed out that this had never been done in the past. Proviously Bulgariane have been given IRO passports.

The problem of commandating with infiltrated agents was reised. Because of the technical difficulties involved, it was desided that sir-ground radies should not be used, except possibly for border creasings. pointed out that the need for this equipment should be included in the nemo to (DEC) sentioned above.

c. The desirability of using Foot is not being explored, and PB-1 is welting to receive the OSO files on bis. (lated that the author of contacting Felohev has been settled and that an approach to his will be made in the next week or on. It was understood that we will lot Velshev operate in the way best for him, which will probably be among the military.

4. Repairie Marfare

etated that FB-VI is looking into what might be more excinct Mulgerie in the near future, but is unable to recommend any specific nessures which would not depend upon the establishment of a net first. FE-VI will, however, submit some suggestions pertinent to economic variare. As pointed out proviously, PB-VI was asked to consider the use of PE channels for accessic warfare purposes.

5. Other



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a. There was very little discussion of the calcatine Bulgarian newspaper proposal. () commented that he did not feel the Bulgarian amigres in Falcetine were likely to be of such operational use to 07%. ABE-I will emplore this matter further with SADO and OFG.

b. It was agreed that there is no necessity to go into detail now on the problem of liaison with the Greek and Turkish services. [will explore the issue of contacting the Greeks when he errives.] sold ABD-I will determine what progress Houses.] and [wade with the Turkish services.]

e. The problem of Tite is a very complex one and is being explored by ABS-J. Consideration of cooperation with fite is premature at this time.

e. He new field personnel have been signed up, but some contacts have been made.

1. () concenced the discussion of the SCRIEND agends by stating that 050 had shown him a copy of the Greek plan for operations into Albania. He mumarized the main points of significance in the plan and said that 050 would make most of the details available through shannels. He general agreement was reached as to whether the Greek plan throws a completely new light on Albanian operations, although (felt that it might affect them significantly.

It was falt that it might be both feasible and desirable to have the broadasst ship fly the flag of Fanama. It was agreed that the ship should be based in Greece and not in Italy. The problem of the difficulty of port classance for conserval ships was pointed out, but there was little discussion of this point.
