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Froject A

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1. OBJUCTIVE:

This project has as its aim the maintenance of the HTNEIGH as an overt vehicle for IT and TH covert activities spannet Allamia.

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2. ORIGIN AND POLICY GUIDANCE:

a. Origin. BEFILMD Project Outline approved 22 June 1949. Country Flan for Albania, Operations Annex B, Tab C-Folitical Marfare Operations.

b. Shence proposed. Project originated in Headquarters.

3. SITUATION:

Since 19h8, when the Tito regime broke with the Aremlin, Albania has been isolated from direct land connection with the other Soviet satellites. This, in addition to the ruggedness of the terrain and the tradition of clandestine activity by the Albanians, particularly the mountain tribesmen in the north, appeared to make Albania a promising target for clandestine activity aimed at the eventual overthrow of the present Communist regime. The presence of a considerable number of Albanian refugees in Europe suggested the development of a political center outside Albania composed of representatives of non-totalitarian elements, sympathetic with U.S. policy objectives in the Balkans, to serve as a rallying point for anti-Communist elements inside Albania. SMYOPIA and KUMAKK in the summer of 19h9 were responsible for the formation of the HTNEIGH, a political center of representative democratic Albanian refugees, to serve as cover for covert operations in Albania. Since that time, both PP and PM operations have been conducted in the name of the HTNEIGH.

4. PROPOSAL:

The HINDIGH is a representative group of Albanian refugees, acting as the focal point for exiles interested in the ultimate liberation of Albania; it acts as the overt agency for covert activities; it serves to publicize the plight of the captive Albanian people via press media operated by the Committee. The HINDIGH is jointly controlled by representatives of NULAHK and SMIOPIA. It has been made clear to the HINDIGH that is is in no sense regarded as a "Government in Fxile".

5. OPERATIONAL OUTLINE:

a. Sub-proposals or tasks:

*(1) Fublication of the HFMLIGH newspaper GAFALING in Albanian, and a digest once a month for use in air drops.

(2) Fublishing when appropriate of the Albanian News Letter, a bulletin printed irregularly in anglish, French and Italian and distributed to the major press bureaus.

"The preparation of a digest is primarily conducted under project

OBTUSE for which this project provides over and occasional support.

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*(3) Preparation of texts for propaganda leaflets and scripts for clandestine radio broadcasts.

*(4) Operation of a mail campaign of "poison pen" letters to ranking leaders of the Communist regime in Albania.

(5) Monitoring Radio Tirana; scanning world press for Albanian news and items which can be used in the TW program.

(6) Liaison with other emigre groups, particularly those associated with the National Committee for a Free Europe (NCFE)

(7) Research and political studies.

b. Key Personnel:

(1) A headquarters case officer will maintain liaison with the HTNEIGH in New York.

(2) All other direct liaison will be maintained by members of the Albanian Branch stationed in Athens, except for a contact with the indigenous agent publishing the newspaper in Rome, which will be maintained by an SE officer stationed in Rome.

c. Indigenous Groups and Leaders:

(1) The HTNEIGH is composed of representatives of the major Albanian political groups, and of independents. The HTNEIGH Executive Committee is made up of leaders from all groups. The Committee was reorganized in December 1953 to include groups not previously represented.

d. Target Groups:

(1) The people of Albania are a target group in the sense that all of the PE efforts of the HTNEIGH are directed toward fostering a spirit of passive resistance directed toward the ultimate liberation of these people.

(2) The Communist Covernment of Albania is a target for defection appeals and ridiculs.

c. Duration. This project will be of indefinite duration, its termination depending either upon lack of success in its objectives or the overthrow of the Communist regime in Albania and the creation of a non-Cominform government friendly to the Rest.

6. SECURITY:

- a. Cover. The HTNEIGH is an overt organization which provides cover for clandestine activities conducted in its name.
- b. Knowledgeability. Members of the HTNEIGH are aware of ODYOKE interest and financial support. SEYOPIA was jointly responsible for the formation of the HTNEIGH. The Greek Government is aware in general of operations conducted from Greece in the name of the HTNEIGH. The Italian Covernment is aware unofficially of ODYOKE backing and financial support of the NTNEIGH.
- * These activities are primarily conducted under projects OBTUSE and OSTECT, for which this project provides cover and occasional support.

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- c. Operational security. Mey PBPRIAL personnel working directly with Albanians use aliases. While the Italian Government has been informed by ODACID that PBPRIME is in sympathy with the aims of the HTNEIGH, it has not been informed officially of PBPRIME backing and financial support. The perspaper and news bulletin are published overtly by the MINEIGH. Material for air drops over Albania is printed in Frankfurt and/or Athens on secure premises. PP and FM activities conducted in the name of the MINEIGH from Greece are carried out with the knowledge and assistance of the Greek Government. The primary security concern is to ensure that ODYOKE participation in the activities of the MINEIGH not be vulnerable to proof before the UN or other international body or become the object of embarrassing newspaper or other publicity. Present methods of compartmentation of operations are believed to reduce this possibility to a minimum.
- d. Risks. Exposure to the UN or other international body of official backing of the MTNEIGH and substantial direction of its activities by a PBPRIME Government gency would embarrase the PBPRIME Government seriously. However, operational security has kept these operations within the requirements of plausible disclaimer.
- e. Personnel Disposel. Project termination would present a personnel disposal problem for the members of the HTNEIGH and attempts at resettlement would have to be made.
- f. Disaster Plan. Key HINEIGE personnel are included in the over-all disaster/evacuation plan for Italy and the Mediterranean theater but will not be evacuated to the United States.

7. OOORDINATION:

- a. Relation to other projects: The project is a PP project under the Albanian Country Program and as such is directly related to the other projects being directed against Albania.
- b. Significance within over-all program in area: This project is an integral part of the Albanian Country Plan.
- - (2) The GDACID furnishes policy guidance.

(3) Propaganda is jointly approved by the SMOOTHER and PBPRIME representatives. SMOOTHER WSFISHY concults with ONYOKE on policy. The HTNEICH maintains contact with QKIVORY although it is no longer paid through that organization.

- a. Current Status: This project has been operative since 1949 under the parent project OBOFUS (formerly BOFILAD).
- b. Commitments. Implicit commitment to the members of the HTNEIGH to pursue efforts toward the successful overthrow of the Communist regime. Implicit commitment to make certain that HTNEIGH members who have loyally supported our policy are not eventually abandoned to their own devices if they should be without other means of support.
- c. Effectiveness: HTNLICH is known within the country and is generally considered as a major rallying point for albanian exiles.
- d. Anticipated Results: Harrassment of the Communist regime in Albania; fostering the spirit of resistance; when success believed possible, sponsoring a coup d'etat.

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Project B

1. OBJECTIVE:

The aim of this project is to further the PF mission of KUBARK against Albania by means of clandestine radio broadcasts of a propaganda nature.

2. ORIGIN and POLICY CUIDANCE:

a. Origin. BGFIEND Froject Outline approved 22 June 1949. Country Flan for Albania. FW Annex to BGFIEND, 10 October 1949.

b. Whence proposed. Project originated in Headquarters.

3. SITUATION:

Since 1948, when the Tito regime broke with the Kremlin, Albania has been isolated from direct laud connection with the other Soviet satellites. This, in addition to the ruggedness of the terrain and the tradition of clandestine activity by the Albanians, particularly the mountain tribesmen in the north, appeared to make albania a promising target for clandestine activity aimed at the eventual overthrow of the present Communist regime. The SMOOTHER and PHFRIE services in the summer of 1949 were responsible for the formation of HTNLIGH, a political center of representative democratic Albanian refugees, to serve as cover for covert activities for projected operations in Albania. (See project OBLIVIOUS.) Since that time, both PF and FM operations have been conducted in the name of the HTNLIGH.

After repeated efforts to engage in clandestine PW against albania via covert radio broadcasts from the high seas, arrangements were completed with the Government of LCFLANE in the spring of 1950 which permitted KUBARK to create a communications installation in the LCDRINK area for the purpose of FW broadcasting to the satellites. On 18 September 1951, HTCHUEBY was activated and has broadcast on an almost daily schedule into Albania since that time in the 43 and 46 meter bands.

L. PROPOSAL:

The establishment of HTCHURHY was based on the belief that as a corollary to HTNEICH, a supplementary PN effort was necessary which would direct its efforts entirely to the creation and maintenance of a feeling of hope in the minds of the Albanian people inside the country. Consequently, with propaganda guidance from Headquarters, HTCRURBY broadcasts into Albania news from the Free Forld, advice to the populace, encouragement for passive resistance and justification of the hope of ultimate liberation.

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5. OPERATIONAL OUTLINE:

a. Sub-proposals or tasks. At the appropriate time HTGRUBBI broadcasts will be used to call the people of Albania to support active resistance activities.

b. Rey Personnel: One PBPRIME Albanian-speaking case officer is responsible for program content, administrative support of the Albanian staff, and liaison with Coumo for maintenance of the Technical establighment.

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c. Indigenous Groups and Leaders: An indigenous propaganda staff of five persons who write scripts and act as broadcasters under the supervision of the PEPAINE case officer.

d. Target Groups: Generally, the entire population of Albania, specifically (e.g., defection appeals) Albanian and Russian Corrainist officials.

c. Duration. The project is of indefinite duration, its termination being dependent either on the alteration of KUBARK objectives in Albania or proof that broadcast reception within the country is so limited that the cost of maintaining the project cannot be justified.

6. SECURITY:

a. Cover: The clandestine redio operates in the name of HTNGIOH, with the propaganda staff ostensibly members of the HTNGIGH LCDRINK welfare office.

b. Knowledgeability. Members of the HTNEIGH and of the propaganda staff are aware of ODIOKE but not of KUBARK interest as such. EMMOPIE officers are sware of KUBARK interest, as are certain LOFIAKE officials.

• Operational Security: Operational security is maintained through compartmentation and complete separation of the propaganda staff from the actual technical establishment.

d. Risks: imbarrassant of ODIGKE and of the LCFLANE Government as the host country.

e. Personnel Disposal: Project termination would present a personnel disposal problem as regards the Albanian staff. Attempts at resettlement would have to be made.

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f. Disaster Plan: Fersonnel are included in the over-all disasterevacuation plan for LCFLAKE, but will not be evacuated to the U.S.

7. CODEDINATION:

a. Relation to other projects. The project is a PP project under the Albanian Country Program and as such is directly related to the other FI, PP and FM projects being directed against Albania.

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b. Significance within overall program in area: Integral part of PE effort.

c. Extent of coordination:

(1) Activities directed by the chief of the Albanian operations staff in LCDRINK under direction of Sanior Representative and the chief of the PP staff. Communications Division provides technical equipment and personnel.

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(2) No other agencies involved, except with respect to policy guidance from ONACID.

(3) Propaganda guidance policy provided by ODACID and SMOOTHER MSFISHY. LOFLAR Government permits broadcasts from LCFLAKE soil.

8. CONTROL:

a. Nature of: The project is financed by KUBARK. All scripts edited and supervised by KUBARE personnel. Ideological and financial motivation of propagands staff.

b. Administrative Plan: NA

c. Reports: Field reporting in accordance with Field Regulation 50-11. Submission of copies of scripts to Headquarters.

11. GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS:

a. Current Statue: Fully operative.

b. Commitments: NA

c. Effectiveness: Refugees and agents have confirmed that broadcasts are heard inside the country. Intensive jamming of broadcasts since August, 1953 indicatos concern on the part of the Albanian Communist regime lest the programs reach the population.

d. Anticipated Results: To keep the spirit of resistance alive in Albania; encourage the population to aid operational teams; and if practicable to call on the people to overthrow the Hoxha regime.

e. Evaluation: Reports upon which to evaluate effectiveness of Project are scarce. Monitoring reports from a base in Bari give an indication of the quality of the signal, which has been variable. To date the best basis for judging has been the intensive jamming done by the Albanian Government which has been observed since August 1953. A continuing effort will be made by all practicable means to review the signal effectiveness, jamming interference and impact on the target audience.

This, in solution to the ruggedness of the terrain and the tradition of clandestine activity by the Albanians, particularly the moustain tribesmen in the north, appeared to make Albania a promising target for clandestine activity aized at the eventual overthrow of the present Communist regime. The presence of a considerable number of Albanian refuzees in Europe suggested the development of a political center outside Albania composed of representatives of non-totalitarian elements, sympathetic with our policy objectives in the Balkans, to serve as a rallying point for anti-Communist elements inside Albanic. The SMOOTHER and PEPERE Services in the summer of 1949 were responsible for the formation of the MPNEIGH, a political center of representative democratic Albanian refugees, to serve as cover for covert activities for projected operations in Albania. Since that time, both PP and PM operations have been conducted in the neme of the MTNEIGH; it was a joint PEPRIME-SMOOTHER decision that leaflets would be the most effective means of reaching the largest sudience and a graphic demonstration of the capabilities of the MFNE IGH.

4. PROPOSAL:

at irregular intervals varying from two to eight weake, leaflets or other printed matter (e.g., a digest of the MML(M revenuer) are to be Gropped over Albenia by sterile aircraft. In adaition, an appropriate intervals, food and hard goods will be incluied in the leaflet drops. In eddition, propaganda material will be distributed by other appropriate means. including balloons, mail, etc.

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5. OPERATIONAL OUTLINE:

- a. Sub-proposals or tasks: Leaflets will be used at the appropriate time as a defection appeal to Communist officials and as a call to such action by the population as may be deemed appropriate at ony given time.
- b. Key Personnel:
 - (1) Leaflet preparation is supervised jointly by KUBARK and SMYOPIA officers in Athens.
 - (2) Packing and preparing for distribution of food and hard goods is done by the Athens Psych and Albanian branch personnel; leaflets are packed for airdrop in Athens.

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. Indigenous Groups and Leaders: Leaflets and the digest of QKPALING are prepared by the HTME LOW Propaganda Workshop in Athens.

d. Target Groups:

- (1) The people of Albania are a target for the propaganda leaflete and propaganda supply drops.
- (2) Communist officials are the target for defection appeals.
- e. Duration: The project is of indefinite duration, its termination being predicated on a change in policy which would require discontinuance of leaflet and propaganda distribution.

6. SECURITY:

- a. Cover. All leaflets and propaganda supply drops are made in the name of the HITELOE.
- b. Knowledgeability. Members of the HFMEICH are sware of ODYOKE but not of RUBARK interest as such.

Rome and Athens HIREIGH personnel are fully aware of production of leaflets but have no knowledge of operations concerned with their airdrop over Albania.

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e. Extent of coordination:

(1) All sotivities under this project are carried out by the Albanian Operation Staff in Athens under direction of the Chief of the PP Staff and the Senior Representative, Athens. Athens Air Support Section provides aircraft and crews.

Texts of leaflets receive joint PEPRIME-ENCOTHER approval. (3) and the whole leaflet and propaganda supply program is coordinated. with SMCOPIA. The Greek Government acquiesces in the use of airfield facilities and grants permission for overflights.

11. GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS :

- a. Current Status: Operative.
- b. Commitments: Committed to drops at frequent intervals until such time as the ODACID and SMOOTHER WSFIRHY jointly agree the leaflet program is no longer feasible or advisable.
- c. Effectiveness: Refugees have both seen and beard of leaflets being dropped and report they are passed from hand to hand in spite of penalties imposed by the Communist regime for being in possession of them. The HFMENDE is known to the Albanian people through the leaflet program. The Albanian Government has publicly denounced the leaflet and food supply program and declared it unlawful to retrieve the articles dropped.

d. Anticipated results: It is anticipated that the leaflet program in conjunction with GHREFT will sustain the hope of the people of Albania for ultimate liberation.

- e. Evaluation: Through refugee and agent reports from within the country as well as through the number, type and degree of Government counter measures.

This situation, in addition to the ruggedness of the terrain and the tradition of clandestime activity smong the Albanians, particularly the mountain tribesmen in the north, appeared to make Albenia a promising target for clandestine activity aimed at the eventual overthrow of the present Communist regime. The presence of a considerable number of Albanian refugees in Europe suggested the development of a political center outside Albania composed of representatives of democratic elements, sympathetic with our policy objectives in the Balkans, to serve as a rallying point for anti-Communist elements inside Albania and as a source of potential agent material. The SMOOTHER and PREFILE services in the summer of 1949 were responsible for the formation of the HTMEIGH, a political center of democratic Albanian refugees, to serve as cover for covert operations in Albania. Since that time, both PP and PM operations have been conducted in the name of the MINEICH.

FROPOSAL: **k**.

To recruit, train and infiltrate agent teams for the purpose of contacting and establishing resistance groups, and contacting anti-Communist officials in the government and military establishments. either directly or through the recruitment of resident egents.

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5. OPERATIONAL OUTLINE:

- a. Sub-proposals or tasks:
 - Spotting and recruitment of nuclei for sabotage, G/W and E and E, in that priority.
 - (2) Establishment of W/T communications.
 - (3) Collection of PV meterials within the country.

- b. Key personnel. Albanian operations staff in LOIRINK.

- e. Duration. The project will be of indefinite duration, its termination depending either on an overthrow of the Communist government in Albania or the imposition of such strict security controls as to render this activity impossible.

6. SECURITI

- a. Cover. Agent operations are conducted in the name of HTHEIGH; NUBARK personnel working with the teams pose as FEPRIMES employed by HTHEIGH.
- b. Knowledgeability: Agent teams are aware of ODYOKE interest and backing but not of KUBARK as such.
- c. Operational Security: Security is maintained through the use of compartmented training in secure areas and through covert movement to the point of infiltration.
- d. Risks: The project runs the risk of the capture and torture end/or ennihilation of agent teams, who might make claims of ODYORE backing which could be presented before an international body, and result in the withdrawal of permission to operate from LCFLAKE soil, thereby causing the ODYORE embarrassment in its international relations.
- a. Personnel disposal. Some arrangements have been made with LCFLAKE officials for the disposal of former agents, and with UKEP for the resettlement and rehabilitation of 9thers.

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 Disaster Plan. The evacuation of key agent personnel from the area is included in the master plan for LCFLAKE and the Mediterranean Theater, but does not provide for evacuation to the United States.

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7. COORDINGTION:

- a. Relation to other projects. The Project is a PM project under the Albanian country program and as such is directly related to the other PP/PM projects under that plan.
- b. Significance with overall program within area. The Project is an integral part of the Albanian country program.
- c. Extent of coordination. The project has been concurred in by the Senior Representative and is assisted by KUBARK Commo; the ICFLAKE Government (through the LCFLAKE Central Intelligence Service) and the EMOOTHER Government (through SMYOPIA are formally notified of general aspects of its operation.

8. COMTROL:

- a. Nature. The project has physical control of the agents while they are in LCFLAKE and relies on agent idealogical motivation as well as agent financial dependence upon the PEPRIMES.

- c. Reports. A weekly summary of agent-base W/T traffic is submitted to Headquarters from the field. Regular monthly operational reports are received, along with additional reports at the time of recruitment, of dispatch and following the return of the agents.

- d. Anticipated results. The creation of resident intelligence networks, establishment of contacts and the securing of operational intelligence to provide the basis for an internal resistance organization.
- e. Evaluation. The project is evaluated in terms of contacts claimed and where possible, verified information collected, successful exfiltration of teams to proper place and on schedule.
