1. IIE Ichitaro (0064/0127/0001/1129/6743), a Progressive Party (Kaisan To) member of the House of Representatives of the Japanese Diet, asked the following questions of Chief Cabinet Secretary OGATA Taketora (4872/2455/4554/5706) during an interpellation session held early in February 1953:

- a. What is the primary objective of the proposed information organization: information, or intelligence?
- b. Will the organization engage in communications intelligence or decoding?
- c. What is the required budget appropriation for the proposed organization?

2. OGATA's replies were as follows:

- a. The organization will only collect and disseminate information; it will not engage in intelligence.
- b. It follows that it will not engage in communications intelligence or decoding.
- c. The organization would require a budget appropriation of about £150,000,000 and would employ about thirty persons.

1. Source Comment. IIE's questions would indicate that he had information stating that OGATA intended the information bureau to be an intelligence organization.

Field Comment. FJ-59 contained an Asahi Shimbun article dated 10 January 1953 which claimed that the authorities were considering using the information bureau for intelligence operations, including communications intelligence; hence it does not necessarily follow that OGATA's intention was the only enquiry made by IIE. However, the question concerning the proposed Bureau was the only one asked by IIE.
