- 4. It was mentioned to JONES that a report had been received from Italy that he had recently been in Belgrade. JONES denied this categorically and guessed that it was just another attempt on the part of the Italian police to smear him. At our second meeting he stated that he believed the source of the story was very likely one Mme PLATTI. She is a long-time informant of the Milan carabidiere officer PISCIELLI who was in contact with DULLES and JONES during 1944-45. Several weeks ago, at a dinner party in Lugano which both JONES and PIATTI attended, JONES was invited by a Yugoslav business acquaintance to visit the latter in Belgrade. Shortly thereafter JONES went to Venice. During his absence PIATTI called at his house and was informed by the maid that JONES was in Venice. He adduces that PIATTI thereupon assumed he had gone to Iugoslavia.
- 5. In a different context, JONES was asked if he knew Olgan NINCICH. He claimed no knowledge of the lady. If his surmise about Mme PIATTI is correct, it is possible that there is confusion between Olgannicich and Jacqueline Oltramare, whom JONES assisted in getting to Yugoslavia shortly after the war. Both these women have been reported to be TITO's mistress.
- 6. - 11. JONES also asked that, if he undertook to go to work for us, we tip off the Swiss police as to what he was doing. This, we feel, could be done but the problem is not so clean-cut. If we ask the Swiss to close an eye to JONES' activities, we could not draw the line between his intelligence work and his personal business affairs which could well-rum afoul of Swiss laws.
- 12. We explained to JONES that if he again were to work for us it would be on a straight agent basis. Asked what he estimated he would require, he ligured about \$200 per month plus any travel expenses incurred in our behalf.
- 13. Throughout the conversation we laid on that the approach being made to him was entirely on our own. We implied that we felt we could probably clear it with headquarters but that, of course, the final decision would rest there. We suggested that a four month trial period along the lines he proposed would be feasible, and we urged him to look up his old contacts and report to us at the next meeting just what he could offer. This JONES agreed to do. It was also emphasized that his contact with us must be kept very tight, and that he was not to intimate anything about it, even to the Consulate or Legation. Our next meeting was arranged for about two weeks later in Zurich which seems the best and most convenient spot to carry on our contacts at the moment.
- 14. We will report to you the results of the next meeting and just what JONES suggests in the way of contacts and operations. We plan to debrief him at that time on a number of unresolved questions.
- 15. WASH-2396 has just been received. We will go ahose along the lines suggested by you and as outlined above.
