3 January

Telephone call from CALLEY in ilano asking if I were coming down to bilano, and an appointment was fixed for Tuesday at his office in Milano. (SEAREM traces: MASH-2705, etc.).

Around noon a telephone call from Jug 2 asking me to be in Milano on Saturday at three thirty in the afternoon, as Jug #1, who had been retarded in arriving, would be there only for the afternoon and evening and must see me. As I had planned to go to the Riviera over this weekend, I tried to arrange things otherwise, but he seemed very upset and said Jug II thought it absolutely necessary that we meet and this was the only day, so I agreed to meet him, and put off the Riviera till later, as I thought it might be for the meeting with partic (MSBA-2511, etc.).

4 January

Off to Milano at eight and straight to ChillAN (MSBA-2010, etc.) for appointment to go over the documents pertaining to his request for nationality. He says—MARAZZA (FSBA-2010, etc.) is in agreement to send it through at once, as soon as CROSS (FASH-6705, etc.) presents it, and that GLLIAN would make him a nice little gift for services rendered. Remained to lunch. Present were both OLLIANS, Binnie BARNES, British movie actress and her Hollywood husband, a certain TRANCO/ITCH, also the Dishop of Bergamo and a very frightened young priest, both very bewildered at finding themselves in the CLLIAN entourage. I was worn out at the end of the lunch, for the GLLIAN's don't speak Italian, and Binnie and husband nothing but inglish, and the clergy nothing but Italian, and hrs. CALIAN giving me complete details on the latest sex life of her Musband in French. CLLIAN is now financing a film with Sinnie DARNES, directed by her husband, which is being made in Rome at the moment.

Appointment at two thirty with CIV. RINIS (ESSA-2610, etc.) in their flat, but Herato had left that morning for Rome and Mrs. CIGARINI very uncommunicative about what he was doing or what was happening, and only intent on getting the furniture into the flat as soon as possible. She wants my wife and tyself to dinner next week, and this is always better, as CIGARINI is a great admirer of my wife and can't resist showing off when in her presence, thereby revealing much more than usual.

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Appointment at four with SEALEY in his office at the Consulate. Fo first invited my wife and me to lunch on Sunday next at his house in Moltrasio, and he would next us at Ponte Chiasso. I accepted.

He wanted to discuss the following things: (NOTE: Also covered in BERN-2521).

1. CROSS, in whom they are very much interested, as he has contacts with satellite countries that they think interesting. He asked about the paraport question, but 1 said I had not seen CROSS for some time now and he had not officed them to me. We asked me to find out if possible. I taked him how they knew about the CLLIAN passport question, and he replied that CLDIAN had teld MANAZIA that I had presented him to a certain Mr. CHOSS, British Intelligence, who would help him with the passport and PRAZZA had referred it back to the British, not knowing at the time who CROSS was.

want to be able to follow down at least one shipment in detail to know exactly how it is being done, and through whom. He said he had a legitimate buyer, a Hungarian, (who naturally reports to him after, but who is really buying), and would I present him to MEAZZA as a possible buyer. He said MEAZZA was really interesting, for in the first week of December REALE (MSBA-2279, etc.), former Ambassador to Poland and leading CP light, had intervened personally and the concensus now was that MEAZZA must be one of his men and therefore of considerable importance in the CP. It seems that the case of MEAZZA had come up again over a traffic in charity packages (MSBA-2610) and REALE had intervened in his behalf. I said I had not seen MEAZZA for a long time now and I personally did not like this fort of thing, but if the occasion should arise when I could, I would, but that I couldn't just take his Hungarian around at the moment, as that would be too suspicious.
