Subject: Former German agents suspected of working for Yugoslav Intelligence in Greece at present.

To: Major E. Alexopoulos, Greek General Staff
1. Report has been received that the former German agents mentioned below are presently working for Yugoslav interests in Greece. I should much appreciate any recent information you may have concerning their present whereabouts and activities.

2. a) STEINHAUER, Engels or "George", mentioned in the interrogation reports of ANDONATOS, BOUDOURIS and R. KRAUSS, and under arrest as of April, 1945.

b) von WIRTH, Alphonse, active in Salonika for Amt III F, with KIRCHNER, SPAATZ, etc. during the war. Personal description: 1.80 tall, slim, silvery hair, light eyes, about 33 years old, scar under left eye.

c) Major VARDOULAKIS

d) Captain KOUKAKIS

e) ORSTEIN, Hans or John

f) SALTIEL, Salonika Jew

g) Raymonde BARRY, divorcee, presently in Paris and expected back in Athens shortly. (Not previously known to this office as a suspect.)

Subject: Harris CHRISTOGEORGOU

Reference: Your request of May 1946 for information
on Subject from Fritz STEFAN, presently
being held at Camp 91/IV, Darmstadt.

1. STEFAN was transferred to the Gestapo office in Athens, Greece in January 1944 where he remained until June 1944, at which time he was transferred to the Gestapo office in Paris, France. During his stay in Athens, he made the acquaintance of CHRISTOGEORGOU, who immediately requested STEFAN to forward letters to a girl friend of CHRISTOGEORGOU's in Berlin, through German postal channels. (These letters, according to STEFAN, were love letters). CHRISTOGEORGOU related to STEFAN that he was of Albanian descent, and had received his education in Athens. He entered newspaper work and was employed by a Greek newspaper (name unknown) in Danzig. He was a war correspondent (Kriegsberichter) for this paper and was in Warsaw at the time this city was captured by the Germans. CHRISTOGEORGOU later worked with the propaganda ministry in Berlin as interpreter and translator. In Berlin he became friendly with the German girl (name unknown) mentioned previously, and according to CHRISTOGEORGOU this intimacy caused his expulsion from Germany. After his expulsion from Germany, CHRISTOGEORGOU returned to Athens.
 2. STEFAN is of the opinion that CHRISTOGEORGOU was a lazy individual, disinterested in any type of work, who lived by his wits. STEFAN further stated that he was greatly surprised by the large sums of money constantly in CHRISTOGEORGOU's possession and thought that such money was obtained by CHRISTOGEORGOU's denunciations of black marketeers, for which work CHRISTOGEORGOU would receive ten percent of the value of the seized articles. STEFAN indicated that although CHRISTOGEORGOU was favorable to Germany, he was distrusted by the Germans, who distrusted all Greeks.
 3. It was further stated by STEFAN that he had never confirmed any of the foregoing statements regarding CHRISTOGEORGOU, but had formed his opinions concerning this individual from observation of his behavior, and from talks with him.
 4. If any further information should be received as a result of the investigation, we shall be happy to forward it to you.

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
