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RIOTS IN POLA CONTINUE; GEN. BANJINA TO COMMAND YUGOSLAV TROOPS IN FREE TERRITORY

It is reported from Trieste that the riots in Pola, which have been already going on for three days, reached their climax when the Yugoslav population attempted to expell from the city the remaining Italian population. A certain number of Italian food shops was broken and the remaining shops were plundered, so that the Italians were deprived of the possibility of getting food. About 25.000 out of 32.000 Italian inhabitants have already left Pola. It is officially announced in Trieste that Gen. Ante Banjina, former leader of Yugoslav partisans, will be the commander of the Yugoslav unit of 5.000 men which will be garrisoned in the future Free Territory of Trieste, together with a similar number of British and American troops.

NEWLY ELECTED HUNGARY'S PREMIER STRESSES THE NEED FOR
COLLABORATION WITH NEIGHBORING STATES

Budapest: Tanjug's correspondent reports that yesterday in the largest Budapest square the final celebration of the Army (?) Week was held at which the President of the Government and War Minister Lajos Dinnyes made a speech. The Prime Minister stressed that today's celebration is one of the phases in the realization of Kosut's ideas of 1848. The newly organized Hungarian army, he said, has put itself into the service of Kosut's ideas and has entered in friendly contact with the armies of neighboring peoples, because the new Hungarian army does not want war but to collaborate with the Danubian peoples. The President of the Government further stressed that the Hungarian army wants to live in peace not only with its neighbors but with all democratic and freedom-loving peoples of the world as well. The Hungarian democracy, further said President Dinnyes, is following straight and open road in the strengthening of democracy and raising of the standard of living of all toilers ... Only the defeated heroes of the Reaction and corruption are spreading unfounded news that chaos and disorder prevail in the country. On the contrary, unrest prevails in the camp of the conspirators, black-market operators ... Democracy has now enough force to eliminate from its ranks all its enemies. The question is who is with us and who is against us, stated President Dinnyes ...

RADIO VENEZIA GIULIA SUMMARY

Radio Venezia Giulia also reports that Yugoslav General Ante Banjina, future commander of 5,000 Yugoslav soldiers who will garrison the Free Territory of Trieste, passing through Trieste a few days ago, has been received by General Moore, commander of the 88th American Division.

ZAGREB TRIAL

The trial against Ustasha criminals was continued today in Zagreb. Ustasha general Moskov, one of Pavelic's most prominent collaborators and commander of the Ustasha formation "Pavelic's Body Guards" was interrogated today. To the question of the presiding judge regarding Pavelic's attitude towards Macek during the occupation, Moskov replied that Pavelic had ordered that Macek's requests and orders should be acted upon immediately. He quoted Pavelic as having said that Macek's wishes must always be met.

To the question as to whether it is known to him that Macek visited Pavelic, defendant Moskov replied that Macek personally saw Pavelic two days before he fled from the country. He declared that neither he nor Pavelic pressed Macek to leave the country, but that Macek himself expressed the wish to flee abroad.

To the question as to whether he knew whether Pavelic gave Macek money, Moskov answered that he knows that Macek received money and that Preselj, who was some sort of Macek's secretary, complained to Bulat that he (Macek) had received too little. Thereupon Macek received one thousand 20 franc coins.
