MEMORANDUM

SUBJECT: CARRIAGE Assessment of

PL 489

TO [ ]

1. Chief of Test: Specific—investigation of truthfulness of charges that subject has a history of communist or pro-communist agent activities.

2. Procedure: Subject was tested on 20 December 1951, standard CARRIAGE procedure being employed.

3. Estimated Reliability of Results: Subject cooperated willingly during the assessment and seemed worried about the charges against him. His heart beat was rapid—120 p or minute, and subject claims he has carditis. Reactions in response to control questions were weak in the heart pattern, stronger in the breathing pattern. Results can be classified as "fairly reliable" in a scale of "reliable," "fairly reliable," and "unreliable."

4. Summary of Results: It seems that the subject told the basic truth during the assessment. He was sensitive primarily to the questions regarding the Americans' denying him entry into the United States. In regard to the specific charge—association with the KPD—no specific reaction reactions were recorded. It can be assumed that the subject told the truth in stating that he never contemplated joining that party, that he never talked with a Soviet rep attraction officer, that he, as of the time of assessment, did not have an agent history in behalf of a communist power.

The subject apparently is the person he claims to be. He told the truth in stating that when in Pilsen he passed himself off as a Pole, using the name Sobotta. He seems to be genuinely anti-communist, largely because of nationalistic motivation, and apparently was never a member of any communist party. For a time the subject served in a German organized youth brigade engaged in construction work (Bunddienst). Subject once headed a DP camp, and although apparently never a member of GUN/B, cooperated with them until they became unbearable to him. Subject is unsure of the political opinions of an uncle in New Jersey and suspects that at one time that uncle was pro-communist.

5. Operator's Estimate of Subject: Subject appears to be intelligent, with a tendency to meticulousness. He was worried during the test, and seems to have moods of melancholy or depression. He also exhibited symptoms of hypochondria; but as he claims, he may suffer from some heart disorder.

6. Remarks and Recommendations: In the opinion of the operator, and on the basis of the CARRIAGE data, the subject told the essential truth during the assessment in regard to the charges of pro-communist activities or intentions.

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
